In the spring of 1927, antiforeign riots drove the missionaries out of Hofei as well as out of other stations of China, However, as soon as it was possible the Corprons returned to build an even greater work. Again in 1937, they were hindered from returning to China after furlough because of the invasion of the land, but in 1939 found the way clear and they again re-

turned to Hofei.

These last three years have been of utmost significance to Christian missions in China. Dr. Corpron tells of the great importance of the Christian hospital in this isolated community of occupied China.


