DOCTOR AT CHINA MISSION TO TALK

Dr. Douglas S. Corpron, who will speak at the 11 o'clock service Sunday at the First Christian church, is the doctor in charge of the Luchowfu Christian hospital, Hefei, China, supported by churches of Disciples of Christ through the United Christian Missionary society. This is the only hospital with facilities for major surgery for a radius of over 100 miles.

Dr. Douglas Corpron will be at the First Christian church Sunday morning, January 11, in connection with the nation-wide Emergency Million Campaign of the Disciples of Christ.

This campaign is to meet the emergencies of the educational and missionary work of Disciples of Christ, both of the continuing work and that brought about through national defense and the world at war. The money will not only help to relieve the acute situation in this and other countries, but will help relieve the problems facing the local churches. Hundreds of schools, hospitals and other institutions are depending on the result of this campaign.

The effort across the United States is to enlist 10,000 individuals giving \$100 or more each to realize \$1,000,000 for these emergencies.
