

SCRAP METAL WORK MEETS OBSTACLE

CHICAGO, Jan. 9 (AP)—Efforts to bring out an increased supply of scrap metal—essential to the production of steel for armament purposes—have met another obstacle in cold weather, industrial salvage circles said Thursday.

Lack of scrap is creating a serious problem in the war program, according to steel makers, because scrap must be used to manufacture finished steel. Smaller plants particularly, said these sources, are dependent upon a steady and abundant flow.

In the past few days, when it was hoped collecting would increase, the trade has remained quiet. Salvage circles blame this on the cold, saying it has prevented dealers from scouring the countryside for material.

Effects of the shortage were evidenced this week when Great Lakes Steel corporation, Detroit subsidiary of National Steel corporation, shut down four of its 16 open hearth furnaces for lack of enough scrap to keep them going.

Sharon Steel corporation, with plants in the Youngstown, Ohio, district, has announced it expected to shut down an open hearth furnace late this week for the same reason.

Mickey Rooney Has Marriage License Says County Clerk

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Jan. 9 (AP)—The county clerk's office discovered Thursday that Mickey Rooney of the films and Ava Gardner, the Wilson, N. D., girl who captured his heart six months after she came west, had been licensed to marry Monday.

The application was issued under Rooney's true name of Joe Yule Jr. The license can be granted tomorrow, under California's three-day law.

In Hollywood, Rooney's studio said he declined to give a hint when the nuptials will be. The license must be used in Santa Barbara county.

NLRB Hearing for Weyerhaeuser Crew Set January 19

A long-awaited national labor relations board hearing on an AFL representation petition for woods employees of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company will be held Monday, January 19, in the city library clubrooms, it was announced Friday by the CIO.

The AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union is asking to be named the sole collective bargaining agent for over 350 Weyerhaeuser employees. The CIO International Woodworkers of America is intervening.

Leaders of both factions regard the hearing as one of the most important yet held in the basin area. Both hope that victory for their union will lead to eventual organization of an estimated 900 Weyerhaeuser mill employees in the same group.

It was generally accepted that an NLRB-conducted election would result from the hearing. The meeting will start at 10 a. m.

Copco Crews Work On Small Jobs

California Oregon Power company crews, handicapped by weather conditions, are working on only small jobs in the basin area, Sam Ritchey of the firm said Friday.

Chief among the smaller projects is one of relocating a line on the west side of the airport. Water crews are at a standstill, Ritchey said.

FROZEN DUMB

CHICAGO (AP)—Running home in subzero cold, Louis Sabatini, 14, slipped on soft ice and fell against an iron light pole.

His tongue hit the pole and instantly froze to it, so tightly that he couldn't even free it with the loss of some skin. With the cold wind pouring in to his open mouth, he couldn't breathe warm air on the pole to thaw his tongue loose.

Policemen, called by Louis' sister, brought hot water and thawed apart the pole and tongue which had been joined 20 minutes.

Resolve to banish food waste from your kitchen. To make your food money supply the maximum of nutrients, buy supplies in the exact quantities you need. The table of quantities given below will help you greatly in your marketing. It is borrowed from an excellent pamphlet called "Stretching the Food Dollar."

STARCHES
Macaroni—An 8-ounce box will make 8 or 9 servings.
Rice—a pound (21 cups) will swell to 8 cups when cooked and make 12 large servings.
Spaghetti—an 8-ounce box of spaghetti will serve seven, not quite as many as a box of macaroni.

FRUITS
Apples—about three medium-sized ones to a pound.
Bananas—three or four to a pound.
Grapes—a large bunch weighing a pound will serve six people.
Pears—three medium-sized pears to a pound.

MEATS
A pound of ground meat will make hamburger balls for four people; combined with bread crumbs or mashed potatoes it will make meat loaf for six or seven.
One flank steak weighing a pound, rolled with dressing inside and baked, will cut into from four to six slices.
Quarter of a pound of dried beef makes three servings of creamed dried beef.
A roast with little or no bone makes four servings per pound.
