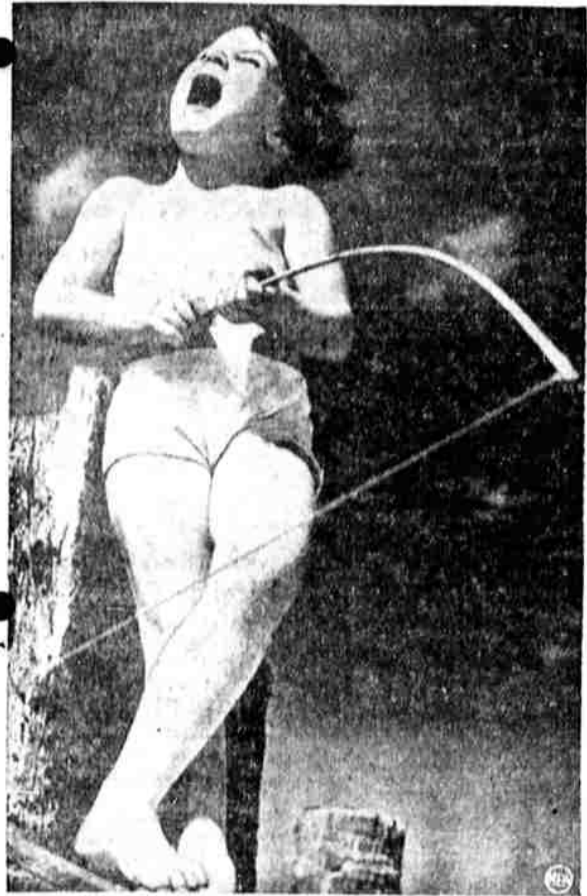

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (UP)—Joe Louis is slipping, he doesn't know it. In fact the Brown Bomber said Friday night in his dressing room after knocking out Buddy Baer in one round that he never punched anybody harder or faster.

Over next door, Baer, the hulking giant who was cut down in the dizzy time of two minutes and 56 seconds, cast his vote the same way Louis did.

Asked if he wanted to meet the heavyweight champion again, Baer shrugged his shoulders and muttered: "What for, if I can't lick him? He keeps getting better."

Champ Retains Title in Shattering Californian

Knockout One of Quickest in Heavy-weight History; Buddy Downed Thrice

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (UP)—Champion Joe Louis registered one of the quickest knockouts in heavyweight championship history tonight in his second title defense against Buddy Baer when he kayoed the huge Californian in 2:56 of the first round. Louis floored Baer three times.

Louis, fighting for nothing, took no chances against the big fellow who had belted him thru the ring ropes in their first engagement at Washington. Laying his golden crown on the line solely to help the navy relief society, the champion put his man away in what may be the second shortest knockout of its kind.

Louis' record kayo was 2 minutes and 4 seconds in his return bout with Max Schmeling. He also kayoed Jack Roper in the first round of a title bout.

Big Buddy showed no fear of the most destructive puncher in heavyweight history, but he lacked the ability to evade the Brown Bomber's barrage of crushing blows to body and head. The bout was scarcely more than a minute old when a series of left and right hooks to the chin toppled him backwards to the canvas. He came down in sections like a factory chimney, and the resin dust rose like smoke from the canvas.

Thundering Right
Buddy rose and tried to fight, but Louis was at him again, bobbing and weaving and smashing him to body and head.

A left hook snapped Buddy's head up and a thundering right exploded on his chin, spinning him to the canvas. Referee Frank Fullam again telled the count over him, and Buddy counted rose at "nine."

Louis, his face twisted grotesquely as he went in for the kill, battered him half around the ring.

One Good Punch
Buddy half rose to his knees at the count of seven and then swayed and rolled crazily over onto his back near the ropes.

He put out a gloved hand and was trying to pull himself off the canvas as the count of 10 was reached, marking the abrupt end of his second attempt to regain the crown once worn by brother Maxie.

Buddy tried his best, but he managed to land only one good punch to the champion's head. That was shortly before he was floored for the first time. As Louis bobbed in, Buddy hit him on the chin with a wagon-tongue right uppercut. It shook Joe up and bloodied his lower lip, but the Bomber merely came in again with renewed violence.

No Surprise
The sudden kayo came as no surprise to the 20,000 fans in Madison Square Garden. Louis had gone into the ring favored at 6 and 7 to 1. Everyone admitted it was just a question of the number of rounds Bud could remain on his feet, despite his showing at Washington in May.

That night Buddy knocked the champion out onto the ring apron in the first round, but was disqualified at the opening of the seventh, when he was helpless from a blow after the bell.

Aliens Warned to Buy Gun Licenses

USGA Halts 1942 Golf Title Play

Open, Amateur, Public Women's Events Cancelled; Pro Tourneys Unhindered

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (AP)—The United States Golf association today cancelled all of its 1942 national championships, including the open, the amateur, the women's title event and the public links' tournament.

While cancelling all of its national championships, the USGA said it would not take any action on sectional tournaments, leaving that to sectional officials to determine.

Joe Dey, secretary of the USGA, pointed out that the action would have no effect on the winter tournaments, since they are controlled largely by the Professional Golfers' association. Both organizations, however, are working together on exhibitions for the benefit of various war relief funds, he said.

The USGA amended its by-laws to permit amateur golfers to receive up to \$100 in defense bonds as prize money in any tournament. Heretofore, amateurs won only trophies. Approval also was given for three nationwide one day tournaments to be played May 30, July 4 and Sept. 7 as part of the "Hall America" physical program.

The three tournaments will be held on a medal play handicap basis at the association's member clubs. The USGA suggested a nominal entry fee be charged to take care of prize monies and expenses with all the surplus being turned over to the American Red Cross.
