Trout Season Opens Here May 2; 15-pound Limit Set

PORTLAND, Jan. 12 (A) Oregon's trout season this year will be from April 18 to Oct. 31 in counties of the western part of the state and from May 2 to Oct. 31 in 11 eastern counties. A number of lakes and streams

will remain closed in the 11 counties, Baker, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Klamath, Lake, Mor-row, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa Wheeler and Malheur, the state game commission decided Sat-

urday.
The limit on trout, which must be six inches in length, was set at 15 pounds and one fish, not exceeding 15 fish in any one day, or 30 pounds and two fish, not exceeding 30 fish, in

y seven consecutive days. Fishing for salmon, steelhead and trout over 10 inches will be open generally the year round in coastal streams, From Nov. 1 to April 17, however, the bag limit will be three of all species in one day and 10 in seven days.


