Sealed bids will be received by the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon, up to and including February 12, 1942, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 31,855 acres within Townships 37 and 38 S., R. 13 E., Townships 37 and 38 S., R. 14 E., and Townships 37, 38 and 39 S., R. 15 E., W.M., Fremont National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 30,000,000 feet B.M., more or less, of live and dead ponderosa pine saw timber, and an unestimated amount of sugar pine, lodgepole pine, California incense-cedar and white fir saw timber to be cut at the option of the purchaser. No bid of less than \$4.15 per M. feet for ponderosa pine, \$2.00 per M. feet for sugar pine, \$1.00 per M. feet for California incense-cedar, and \$.50 per M. feet for lodgepole pine and white fir, will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for the stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$.25 per M. feet B.M. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$.10 per M. feet B.M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required.

\$6,000.00 must be deposited with each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Lakeview, Oregon, or the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon.
