

### VFW INCORPORATES FOR ENCAMPMENT

Articles of incorporation have been filed during the past week legalizing the incorporation of the Klamath Falls Encampment of the Klamath Falls Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. The object of the corporation is to conduct, direct, promote and provide for and entertain and make all necessary arrangements for the state encampment of the VFW, de partment of Oregon, for the year 1942, to be held in Klamath Falls, June 24 to 27 inclusive.

Officers of the commission are J. A. Souther, president; R. O. Miller, vice president; J. N. Brocktrup, secretary; R. M. Hook, treasurer, and H. J. McGilvray, director.

Preliminary plans in connection with the above are well under way, the commission said, and no effort will be spared to make the 1942 encampment the most successful ever held by the department of Oregon. President Souther will announce shortly the makeup of the various sub-committees which will be selected from the membership of Pelican post 1383, VFW, acting as the host post to the encampment. These committees will be in charge of activities coming within the scope of plans laid out for the conduct and entertainment of the encampment.

Any doubts as to cancellation of the encampment, due to war-time conditions have been cleared up by a letter received from Department Commander Louis E. Starr of Portland, reading in part as follows:

"Although many members of our organization are actively engaged in national and civilian defense for an extended period, I believe there is no question but what we will hold an encampment of our detachment on the dates as previously set. If for no other reason the comrades of our department should meet at that time and have a full and complete rally to the support of our state and nation. Only actual warfare within the state should prevent us from assembling at that time. Certainly there is no greater activity we could engage in than to bring our comrades together, comrades who have served in past wars and who are again serving their nation during this crisis."
