## Unemployment Fund Shows Big Increase

SALEM, Jan. 16 (AP)—State unemployment compensation commission collections from employers were 27 per cent greater during 1941 than during 1940, while payments to unemployed were 39 per cent less, the commission said today.

The commission's trust fund at the end of the year was \$6,322,378.561, an increase of \$6,322,229. Benefits paid during the year were \$2,485,554, compared with \$4,099,925 in 1940, \$4,052,888 in 1939, and \$5,916,399 in 1938.

## Little Nancy Merki Heads for Washington

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (AP)—Little Nancy Merki, once an infantile paralytic, now one of the world's great swimmers, headed for Washington Thursday to do her bit in the campaign against poliomyelitis.

The Portland miss, named by the AAU America's outstanding woman swimmer of 1941, was atremble with excitement last night as she boarded the train.

It was partly because she was going to participate in a national radio program for the infantile paralysis fund drive, but

mostly because she was going to meet Mrs. Roosevelt. Partly, too, she said, because she was to be guest of the national sports council at a banquet in New York.

Eight years ago Nancy faced the prospect of being crippled for life. But swimming restored the affected muscles. Presently she was showing her heels to competitors. For the last three years she has been a dominating figure in national competition.

Monday she will tell her story from Washington and give to Mrs. Roosevelt the contributions of her fellow students at Portland's Grant high school.
