

ACRES TO BE OPENED NEAR STRONGHOLD

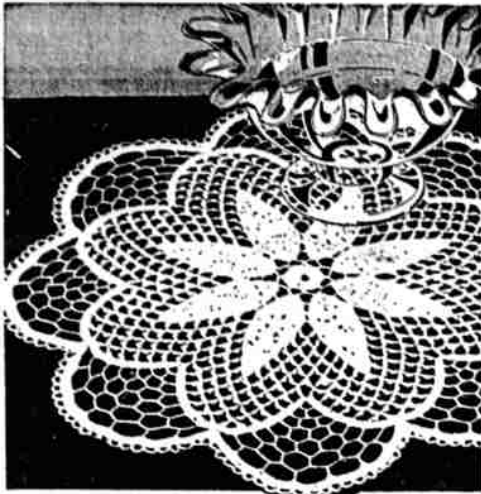
Some 7500 acres of good soil located east of the Stronghold in the Tule lake division of the Klamath reclamation project, will be opened this fall, according to B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the USRS.

This is land the bureau has had ready for opening the past two years, but could not be used due to the high water in the

sump. Details will be announced later, Hayden stated.

Construction of the Klamath reclamation project was begun in 1906. It consists of two divisions, Main and Tule Lake, with irrigation water now available to 66,000 acres, and also serves other Warren act and contracted areas totaling 69,000 acres. Hayden stated Thursday it also takes in pumping plants and Klamath drainage districts including the Van Brimmer, Langell Valley, Horsely, Malin, Shasta View, Sunnyside and Enterprise districts besides 34,000 acres of less lands also watered by the project. This makes a total irrigated acreage of some 169,000 acres.

It is strongly urged that every volunteer worker who took out either sewing or knitting prior to December 15 return it as quickly as possible. The annual Red Cross meeting will be held January 26 and we will be very proud of the report of the production service which will be made at that meeting. We will appreciate the cooperation of all volunteers in helping us make this a complete and up-to-date report.

Three Local Youths Serving Country In U. S. Marines

Anxious to do his part in national defense, Oscar Lee McWilliams, of this city, enlisted in the United States marine corps shortly after hostilities with Japan broke out.

McWilliams has been sent to the Marine corps base at San Diego for basic instruction in the marine corps. Upon completion of this training, he will be assigned to active duty with a combat unit.

The youth is the son of Mrs. Lora May McWilliams of 2112 Orchard street, Klamath Falls.

At the recent outset of war, Lee David Hoesley Jr., was denied no time in becoming a part of Uncle Sam's armed forces. This Klamath Falls youth enlisted in the United States marine corps right where he happened to be at the time, Portland, Ore.

Young Hoesley Jr. was immediately sent to the marine corps base at San Diego to undergo a period of intensive military training learning the fundamentals and technique of 1942 warfare.

After completing this strenuous period of instruction Private Hoesley, son of Mr. Lee D. Hoesley, 3312 Cannon avenue, Klamath Falls, will be assigned to duty with an active branch of the marine corps.

Joining other local youths who are now in the armed forces of Uncle Sam, Edward Cooper, of this city, enlisted in the United States Marine corps while in Portland at the outbreak of the Japanese war.

The son of Mrs. Ruth Roebuck of Klamath Falls, the local youth will be assigned to a combat unit as soon as he finishes recruit training at the Marine corps base in San Diego, Calif.
