Preparation of Medical Students To Be Speeded

CORVALLIS, Jan. 22 (P) — A speeding up of preparation of premedical students is announced at Oregon State college by Nathan Fasten, head of the zoology department and chairman of the premedical work here. Students who ordinarily would not be interviewed for admission in the Oregon Medical school until later in the year have already been accepted, while others must arrange interviews at once, says Dr. Fasten.

Students completing their three-year work for entrance will start actual medical school training in June instead of next fall. This is part of the program to increase the medical facilities of the armed forces as well as for civilian needs as rapidly as possible.

SOVIET SKIERS CHASING NAZIS IN DEEP SNOW

continuing, forward surge of the Russian offensive.

The front reports indicated that the Germans were exhausting every ready resource in manpower in an effort to stabilize the vast front.

New Troops — Among prisoners taken in one sector were soldiers just arrived from France who said they came to Smolensk by train and were carried thence by plane to a point the Russians identified as "R" to help the Germans to make a stand.

The Moscow newspaper Pravda said that in the Volkhov sector of the Leningrad front the Germans were bringing in worn-out detachments from other sectors in their desperation.

Despite these efforts, the red army drive on the Leningrad front continued, with the Germans withdrawing from four villages in the last three days under infantry pressure backed by deadly artillery action. Southeast of Leningrad the Germans were said to have been ejected from 27 villages in a single day.

On the southwestern front, that is, before Kharkov, the Russians acknowledged that the foe had counter-attacked in some sectors but these thrusts were beaten back and the red army rolled on.

BERLIN, Jan. 22 (Official Broadcast Recorded by AP) — The German high command reported today that German forces on the Crimean peninsula repulsed Russian attempts to break through the Nazi encirclement of Sevastopol, main Russian naval base on the Black sea.

The high command's communique said defense actions in the Donets basin and on the central and northern fronts continued.

Repeated Russian attempts to break out of Leningrad were frustrated, the communique added.

The Germans said defensive fighting on the Donets, central and northern sectors was taking place amid severe frost.

(The Russians yesterday recorded a temperature of 40 degrees below zero, Fahrenheit, at Moscow.)

PELLER-DRIVEN SLEDGES are operating west of Borodino "in stinging pursuit of the Germans who are trying to fight their way out of the Mzhaisk salient."

The dispatch adds that these air-borne troops are principally "scouts slashing at the flanks of the Germans retreating toward Vyazma."

THAT is at least historically interesting.

In his disastrous retreat from Moscow, Napoleon followed almost the identical route now used by the Germans retreating from Mzhaisk. His retreating army was harried mercilessly by Cossacks who hung on his flanks (exactly as these modern air-borne ski troops are hanging on Hitler's flanks.)

NAPOLEON, getting finally out of Russia with an unbelievably shattered army, had time to raise another army and get back into the fight.

The reason is interesting. The pursuing Russians were ravaged almost as severely by the rigors of the Russian winter as were Napoleon's fleeing troops and lacked the strength to run him to earth and destroy him.

They, too, had to stop and recruit their forces.

FREIGHT MOVEMENT HERE RUNS HEAVIER

Klamath Falls during 1941 were 21 per cent higher than in 1940. Incoming freight jumped 13 per cent and outgoing shipments 28 per cent.

Reeves said that over 11,000 cars of logs were moved into the city area for milling, a 32 per cent increase over the preceding year.

Great Northern car movement statistics were not released but Harry Wayne, district freight agent, said that the line "enjoyed a healthy movement of forest products and general business in 1941."

Revenue Up

In total revenue at the Klamath station, Bend-Portland announced a 24.7 per cent raise. Consolidated showed a 12 per cent increase. Revenue figures for either of the railroads were not available.

Southern Pacific officials estimated that the company's payroll had increased about 15 per cent during 1941. A portion of the jump was attributed to general pay raises for the last quarter and the balance to increased employment.

Great Northern placed its payroll jump at 32.1 per cent, the result of both pay boosts and increased employment.

Decline Foreseen
Officials of all freight lines were in general agreement that January, 1942, movements were over those of the same month last year but said that because of rubber and metal shortages business during the coming year would not continue at its present rapid pace.

All foresaw a decline in tire, automotive and auto accessory, hardware and appliance merchandise shipment due to limited supplies but the general opinion was that 1942 shipments would compare favorably with those of 1941.

Curtailement of War Profits Asked

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (P) — Demands that congress take immediate steps to limit war profits were sounded in the senate today by Chairman Walsh (D-Mass.) of the senate naval committee and Republican Leader McNary (Ore.).

"Checkbooks will not win this war," Walsh shouted as he asked what drafted men in the armed forces must think when they read congressional reports of excessive profits and new millionaires.

U. S. FIGHTING FORCE POURING INTO WAR AREA

fighter planes as well were ready.

The task entailed also, however, creation of extensive anti-aircraft and other defenses.

Rapid movements of men and weapons were possible because emergency storage yards, other railway facilities and ports of embarkation had been prepared in the past year and a half.

The efficiency demonstrated applies to movements of forces outside the country as well.

The southwest Pacific emergency was not unforeseen, as it was in the cards for years, since the United States tried unsuccessfully to stabilize the Pacific with the first naval disarmament conference and the accompanying nine-power treaty.

The army and navy recognized that if Japan failed to observe these commitments, the United States would be placed at a heavy disadvantage by geography and a limited fleet, and the Japanese soon started first to encroach on and then deliberately to violate the treaties.

Though Japan gained an enormous advantage by surprise on December 7, this already has been offset partly by American production of long range bombers which is on the increase and is destined to mount to great proportions.

As the Pacific crisis grew, a substantial force of heavy bombers was sent to the Philippines, beginning last summer, and although many have been put out of commission, those still in action have been restoring somewhat the balance upset by the loss of warships at Pearl Harbor.

One Killed, 26 Injured as Car Skids Into Bus

CLE ELUM, Jan. 22 (P) — Gerald Strobe of Yakima was killed and 26 others injured when an automobile skidded into a Washington Motor Coach company bus two miles west of Easton late yesterday afternoon.

Strobe was a passenger in the automobile of Edwin A. Hewes, Yakima brokerage firm member, when the automobile started to skid on a turn and cracked into the bus near the front despite the desperate efforts of the driver, John Goodman, to avoid the accident. State Patrolman Boyd A. Rupp reported.

The bus rolled over, skidded along the road and crushed the automobile against a bank on the opposite side of the road, crushing Strobe's head beneath the car's wreckage. Hewes was injured about the head.

Hewes, Goodman and 24 of the bus passengers were taken to the Cle Elum hospital where 22 were released after receiving emergency treatment.

Still confined beside Hewes are:

Nellie Young, Wapato, chest and arm injuries.

Mrs. Allen Goudy, White Swan, head injuries and facial lacerations.

Goodman, of Seattle, facial lacerations.

The bus was eastbound, the coupe headed west, Rupp said.

forcements, however, were making the raids steadily costlier to the Japanese.

(Informants in London said the Hurricanes put into the fight for Malaya probably were the new model—Hurricane 11, latest development of the all-metal single seater which the British say has the greatest fire power of any plane of its kind.)

(With a top speed rated at more than 350 miles an hour, the new Hurricane which sometimes carries two bombs slung under its wings has two types of armament. One class is equipped with 12 machine guns, another has four light cannon jutting from its wings in addition to machine guns.)

School Aid in Harvesting Asked By State Head

SALEM, Jan. 22 (P) — State Superintendent of Public Instruction Rex Putnam asked all school officials in Oregon today to cooperate with the state employment service so that students may be used next fall to work in harvesting crops.

Putnam pointed out, however, that any program arranged to meet the farm labor shortage should be planned with the least loss possible to the children.

Since state law prevents classes on Saturdays, Putnam suggested the student harvesters could make up their classes by elimination of extended vacation periods, by holding classes on a half-day basis during harvesting season, or by adapting opening and closing dates of school to local harvesting conditions, keeping in mind that a full school year must be taught.

sighted 30 to 40 miles off Watom island, which is 15 miles northwest of Rabaul, about half an hour before the Rabaul radio sent its last message.

It was assumed here that the radio and telegraph stations had been demolished by British forces before evacuation in pursuance of a scorched earth policy.

Arthur Drakeford, Australian air minister, declared that the Japanese might attempt a landing in New Guinea today and said "We must prepare ourselves against any eventuality."

The enemy might be expected to launch a full scale military assault against New Guinea, he said, with the object of obtaining bases from which to attack the Australian mainland.

He asserted it was obvious that the Japanese have more than one aircraft carrier in the Bismarck archipelago, supported by covering naval forces and shore-based aircraft, as evidence by air attacks in that region the past two days.

PARKS CASE MOTION HEARING SATURDAY

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg Thursday set 10 a. m. Saturday as the time for hearing on the motion filed to re-submit the case of the state versus George Parks to the grand jury. Parks is held in connection with the Buffalo lunch murder of Dr. Salem A. David.

The motion for re-submission of the case, filed in circuit court Wednesday by District Attorney L. Orth Sisemore, says the state does not possess enough evidence to support the murder indictment "as it was worded." The state could support a felony charge, the motion states. Postponement of the trial was requested.

At the same time, the grand jury and the regular trial jury panel were called to meet at 10 a. m. Monday. The grand jury is short one member, due to one resignation.

Voters Urged to Register to Vote

Voters were urged to register at the courthouse immediately by County Clerk Mae K. Short, who announced Thursday that registration lists are still far from complete with the deadline for primary elections drawing close.

Since the division of many suburban districts, re-registration is necessary for a great number of voters.
