at the gas station, we'd get along fine.

"We got through the bug station all right and then he started to talk a little, although he was not in a good humor. He told me to stop about 15 miles over the California line near Grass lake. I asked him if he wouldn't let me drive to Weed, then I'd turn right around and come back and not squawk. He said he didn't think that was such a good idea. Then he told me to stop and get out of the car and walk across the highway.

"I got out of the car and he stepped around and to the driver's side and sat under the wheel, holding the gun against me all the time. The dome light in the car was on while the door was open and I got a good look at him. I asked him to take good care of my car because I probably wouldn't be able to get another for a long time.

"He then ordered me to walk across the highway, and he started up but it was so slick the car slid into the ditch and he tore off the bumper guard. Then he drove away."

Flag Bus

Boyd then said he got to a California highway patrol truck and within 10 minutes the operator had flagged down a Greyhound bus which took him on into Weed. There Boyd notified officers who called Yreka and the California patrol put out a call to stop the machine. The call went out at 8:52 p. m. and Redmond was arrested in Boyd's car in Mount Shasta City at 9:06 p. m. He was immediately lodged in the city jail there and charged with violation of the Dyer act, federal charge involving the transference of stolen cars across the line.

FBI Gets Case

Later, it is understood, a charge of kidnapping was filed against Redmond. This charge embraces violation of the Lindbergh act and carries with it a possible death penalty. The case now rests in the hands of the FBI, according to Sheriff Lloyd L. Low.

Redmond had the 22 pistol with him at the time of his arrest, police said. He was brought into justice court where his bond was set at \$10,000.

Highway Patrol Captain George Daley said Redmond kidnapped Boyd "apparently just for the ride."

Boyd called his wife and told her the story. Mrs. Boyd asked her husband if he had been hurt. Boyd replied:

"Oh no, we got along swell together. I did whatever he wanted me to do."

A few minutes after Boyd called his home at 615 Upham street, a friend of the family, George Boone, drove to Weed and returned here early Wednesday afternoon with Boyd.

Redmond told police he had been in Klamath Falls a "couple of weeks." Later he said he had been working here for "six or seven months" for the Klamath Ice and Storage company as truck driver and helper. Andrew Collier, storage company head, said young Redmond was "one of the nicest fellows" in his employ and that two weeks ago he had left expecting to go into the navy. Last week he had worked for Klamath Machine and Locomotive works, and it is understood that on Tuesday he had received orders to report for duty in the navy.

Church Member Collier said he had paid a visit to the plant and was "pretty drunk," celebrating his depart-

ure. He came here from Wilcox, Ariz., and seemed to be a good church member, attending a local church each Sunday.

Boyd is head of the Macmillan Ring Free Oil company with headquarters on Spring street. He has made his home here for the past three years coming here from Lakeview.

Army Takes Steps To Get Land for Camp at Medford

PORTLAND, Jan. 28 (P)—First step toward acquiring land for the Medford area U. S. army cantonment was taken in federal court today when condemnation proceedings against 5000 acres were filed.

The land is owned by Deane and Ellen Owens and 27 other individuals and corporations.

Bernard H. Ramsey, special assistant to the attorney general, said that other suits will follow and that the government will acquire 40,000 acres for the military base.

Ramsey said the cantonment eventually was expected to house 30,000 men.

U. S. AIRMEN DESTROY JAP PLANE FORCE

United States fliers thus boosted to at least 36 the number of Japanese ships sunk or damaged in a five-day battle.

Macassar strait, the roadway to Java, headquarters of Gen. Sir Archibald P. Wavell's United Nations command, lies between Dutch East Borneo and Celebes island.

Oil Town Taken

An N.E.I. communique acknowledged that the Japanese had apparently occupied the burned-out oil center of Balikpapan, East Borneo port on Macassar strait.

It was apparent, however, that the invaders had been lured into a deadly trap, set by the Dutch more than a week ago when they announced that Balikpapan's great oil fields had been destroyed and implied that land defenses had been withdrawn.

Hornet's Nest

In accepting the "invitation," the Japanese armada unwarily sailed into a hornet's nest of allied submarines, bombers and surface warcraft. No immediate estimate was available on the loss of Japanese lives, which presumably ran into the thousands.

While the Dutch listed only 30 Japanese troopships and warships sunk or badly damaged, American accounts put the five-day toll at 36, including a battleship.

Dispatches from Batavia did not disclose whether the battle in the shark-infested strait still continued after yesterday's smashing blows by United States bombers.

"Japanese fighter aircraft which attempted to intercept our bombers were roughly handled," Gen. Wavell's headquarters said. "Two were shot down and one was damaged."

Malay War

On the far Pacific land front Japan's invasion hordes drove perilously closer to Singapore today as wavering British defense lines executed a new withdrawal, less than 50 miles north of the \$400,000,000 island stronghold, amid the heaviest fighting of the Malayan campaign.

A British spokesman said that Japanese troops knifing southward from the Klang sector, in central Malaya, were pressing the nearest threat to Singapore.

48 Miles Away

On the west coast, British, Australian and Indian imperials were battling fiercely near Senggarang, only 48 miles above Singapore, after a 12-mile retreat from Batu Pahat.

Twenty-seven Japanese bombers returned to the assault on Singapore itself, attacking a suburban area.

Other Japanese raiders struck heavily at the port of Emmau, on the west coast of Dutch Sumatra, across the narrow Malacca strait from Malacca, setting two ships afire and damaging a third.

The Dutch also conceded loss of communication with the city of Kendari, on the southeast coast of Celebes island, but declared that strong resistance was being exerted against the invaders there.

NEI planes again bombed the airdrome and storage yards at Japanese-held Kuching, capital of the "white rajah" kingdom of Sarawak, part of British Borneo, it was announced.

Midway Marines Repeat Heroic Stand of Wake Island Garrison

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—U. S. marine gunners still holding Midway island taught the Japs that their guns could shoot just as straight in the dark as the guns on Wake shot in the dawn.

The first enemy attack on the Midway post was made the night of Dec. 7, the navy disclosed in a belated report yesterday.

The marine artillerymen waited under a 20-minute enemy bombardment until the Jap warships ventured within 4500 yards of the shore—virtually point blank range for the island's batteries—before opening fire.

Hits Scored

Then shore searchlights flashed on the two approaching ships—a cruiser and a destroyer. The marine batteries roared. Within the first minutes, three hits were scored on one enemy ship—two on the superstructure which put the forward gun out of commission, and a third near the waterline.

The second ship got two square hits near the waterline. The Jap warships immediately broke off the action and steamed out of range, one of them trailing clouds of black smoke from the shellholes in her side.

Similar to Wake Clash

The enemy's reception at Midway was very much like that given the first landing attempt at Wake. The attempt at Wake was made at dawn on Dec. 11. Again the marine batteries were silent until the Japs were 4700 yards offshore.

Then they went into action, sinking a light cruiser, a gunboat and two destroyers out of a 12-ship flotilla before the enemy beat a retreat.

Wake fell to the Japanese after a prolonged heroic resistance, but the marines still have the situation well in hand on Midway.

The Midway attack, incidentally, was a sorry showing for Japanese gunnery. Although the enemy warships shelled the island for 20 minutes, they killed only two marines and did negligible damage to defense positions.

Heroes Named

Two officers were named in the report for especially heroic action at Midway.

One of them, First Lieutenant George H. Cannon, 26, son of Mrs. B. B. Cannon, III, Ann Arbor, Mich., died from loss of blood apparently caused by the fact that he refused to be removed from his command post after he had been seriously wounded.

The other was Corporal Harold R. Hazelwood, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard F. Hazelwood of Stark City, Mo., switch board operator at the same command post.

In spite of shock and a compound leg fracture when the post was hit by a Japanese shell, Hazelwood set up his damaged switchboard and reestablished communications.

Winant Declares U. S. Planning Army of 7 Million

LONDON, Jan. 28 (P)—United States Ambassador John G. Winant today declared the United States plans to recruit an army of 7,000,000 men.

"If it is necessary for the women of America to scrub, drive or transport or man anti-aircraft batteries or pilot planes or whatever else, they will do it gladly," he said.

He said "We know the story of the battle of the Atlantic and if it is necessary that our navy take time to re-establish its supremacy in the Pacific with whatever auxiliary airforce that is required, it will be done and its complete supremacy re-established."

Arraignment of R. E. Kirkpatrick, indicted by the grand jury on a charge of burning personal property to defraud an insurance company, was set over to 10 a. m. Monday.

The grand jury Tuesday returned a true bill against W. L. Sanders on a bad check charge. Sanders is out on bond.

master of the tanker, was crushed between the ship's side and a lifeboat, crew members said, adding that he was the last man to leave the ship.

Guy Devono, 22-year-old radio operator of Clarksburg, W. Va., whose career as a mariner began six and one-half months ago, said that "if we had been armed we would have fought to beat hell."

"Several of us lowered one lifeboat, it capsized and a wave washed it back on the ship's deck," Devono said. "Then we lowered another boat and got away. We rowed to within 50 feet of the submarine."

Because of the darkness of the Delaware coast, Devono was unable to see whether the undersea marauder was a big one or a short-range raider possibly operating from a mother ship.

naissance activity on both sides" in the Libyan desert, Premier Mussolini's high command asserted that the British were continuing to retreat eastward.

On the Crimea front, a German war bulletin asserted that Russian reinforcements landed on the southern coast of the Black sea peninsula had been beaten off and almost completely wiped out in several days of hard fighting.

The red army newspaper Red Star said assault troops were at the approaches of important centers of German resistance in that snow-smothered area, and of these Rzhnev, a railroad center on the upper Volga 130 miles from the capital, is outstanding.
