

SELECTEES TO DANCE FREE AT BIRTHDAY BALL

All Klamath county selectees who have received their orders for induction into the army February 15, are invited to be the guests of the committee in charge of the celebration of the president's birthday on Saturday night in the Klamath Falls armory. It was announced by Chairman S. P. Miller.

Selectees and their sweethearts will be admitted free upon presentation of written orders at the door, Miller stated. The committee also invited all army, navy or marine corps members in uniform to attend the dance without charge.

Persons wishing to leave remittances for tickets to the dance given to raise funds to fight infantile paralysis among the nation's young, may call at the United States National bank and leave their contribution with M. E. Nicodemus, treasurer of the infantile paralysis committee.

A communication was received by Miller on Thursday from Washington, D. C., stating that a radical departure in the use by chapters of the national foundation of the 50 per cent received by them this year from the president's birthday celebration had been decided after a conference with President Roosevelt.

Basel O'Connor, president of the national foundation stated that to make a still greater contribution to national defense and national morale, the national foundation would permit chapters to use wherever necessary a part of the funds received by them this year to assist the dependants of any man in the military or naval service of the United States who becomes a victim of infantile paralysis while in the service.

O'Connor said that the trustees of the national foundation would issue regulations authorizing this expanded defense activity of the chapters.

Churchill Says U. S. Anxious To Meet Nazis

(Continued from Page One) M. Nelson, and disclosed that Singapore had been steadily reinforced for a fight to the finish. These were Churchill's high spots:

The AEF in the United Kingdom—"meets the wishes of the American people and leaders of that republic that the large mass of trained and equipped troops they have in the United States should come into contact with the enemy as close and as soon as possible."

War production—"in reference to appointment of Donald M. Nelson as chief of the war production board in the United States: 'Some similar office, not exactly with the same scope but with similar scope, must be created here.'"

Singapore—"I cannot tell how the Johore battle or the attack on the island of Singapore will go but there has been a steady flow of reinforcements for several weeks past."

In summation of his defense after three days of criticism and reply in general debate, Churchill said:

"I offer no apologies. I offer no excuse and make no promises. I avow my confidence was never stronger than at this moment that we shall bring this conflict to an end in a manner agreeable to the interests of our country and in a manner agreeable to the future of the world."

INSTRUCTIONS OUT ON WOMEN'S POLL

Klamath county's plans for carrying out the statewide mobilization of women registration February 16 went into high gear Thursday, with mailing of instruction outlines to all district chairmen outside the city limits. City chairmen will meet before registration day, to complete procedure for the mammoth undertaking which in Oregon will parallel the registration of men, February 16.

State-wide organization for a house-to-house canvass of the vocational experience, training and propensities of all women over 18 years of age is virtually completed, it was announced Thursday by Mrs. Sallie Orr Dunbar, state director of the Oregon Board for Mobilization of Women.

The purpose of the census is to create a reserve supply of women workers for the state's offices, factories and fields. In case an exodus of men into heavy defense industries produces an acute labor shortage, women will be expected to step up and "man" the jobs vacated by their fathers, husbands, brothers and sweethearts.

Nation-wide attention is focusing on the census of women, since Oregon will be the first state in the union to register the vocational skills of women. It is anticipated that the federal government will request a nation-wide census later on.

The registration here will not be compulsory, nor will it be an application for employment. Women will be called only in case of actual need, and will receive payment in accordance with the prevailing wage scales.

In charge of Klamath Falls' registration of women are Mrs. Marshall Farmer and Mrs. Nelson Reed, with Mrs. Jean Leverich and Miss Elenora Weatherford as county directors.

State CIO Meet To Open Friday

BEND, Jan. 29 (P)—Executive board members of the Oregon CIO met here today to outline final plans for the three-day state convention opening Friday.

John Brost, president, said he expected at least 150 accredited delegates to the convocation which will be marked by a visit from John Brophy, national CIO director, Nan Wood Honeyman, Portland, former Oregon congresswoman, will be a convention speaker.

Proclamation Sets Daylight Time

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 27 (AP)—Daylight time for California, effective Feb. 8, was established in a proclamation today by Governor Culbert L. Olson.

On that date, Olson said, at 11 p. m. clocks will be advanced one hour to put the state on daylight saving time and will remain that way until six months after the termination of war or until congress shall designate an earlier termination.

Olson said "in the interest of our defense production, it is vitally important that daylight saving time be uniformly observed by all industry, business and the citizens generally for the duration of the war."

VINSON BILL URGED

SALEM, Jan. 29 (P)—The executive committee of the Associated Employers of Oregon announced today it had telegraphed Oregon's congressional delegation urging it to support the Vinson bill to require labor unions and business trade organizations to register with the department of commerce and file records of their receipts and expenditures.

CIO Wins NLRB Election Among Lamm Millworkers

The International Woodworkers of America (CIO) Wednesday was named the collective bargaining agency for Lamm Lumber company mill employees in a national labor relations board election at the mill by a vote of 108 for the CIO to 63 for the AFL and 26 for no union.

The announcement was made by Wilbur Yeoman, representative of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union. The poll was held from noon to 6:30 in the mill lunchroom.

Conclusion of the ballot following a bitter contest between the rival unions brought a reverberation Thursday from George Brown, chief representative in the district for the IWA, the winning group. Brown said, "The campaign was characterized by an unusual flood of last-minute AFL bulletins, most of which were misleading and highlighted by opposing claims relative to the status of Lamm woods workers."

The CIO victory gives the group complete bargaining rights for all Lamm employees. The union has held a chapter among woods employees for several years.

William E. Babcock, NLRB attorney, conducted the election. Certification by the board is expected as a matter of course.

Service in View For 60,000,000 U. S. Men, Women

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (P)—Every American man and woman must face the possibility of being in the US armed services. In some essential defense industry "or be able to give very good reasons to the contrary," says Brig. General Lewis B. Hershey.

The national director of selective service told the advertising club yesterday that the selective service system's ultimate objective is the mobilization of 60,000,000 persons for all-out war. Warning against complacency and hysteria in wartime, he added:

"We must realize that we are not now doing many of the things that we shall have to do in the years to come."

CITY EYES REPAIR OF ROUGH STREETS

Klamath motorists are complaining over the condition of the city's streets, the dishpans and chuckholes looming up in a frightening manner with the disappearance of the last coat of ice and snow.

Damage to the streets was severe, City Engineer E. A. Thomas observed Thursday, but little can be done except hand patching until the usual patching season which comes in June. It is possible that this may be upped a bit to May, Thomas stated.

Main street suffered greatest damage from the cold spell, although South Sixth street had some bad spots and the viaduct took a beating. The state highway department has patched holes in the viaduct and the state will repair all highways throughout the city from South Riverside to North Ninth street on Main street and possibly down to Spring street. The state patching crew usually hits here in the early fall or late summer, but due to the condition of the roads it is hoped crews will be detailed to this locality somewhat earlier.

The state highway has been asked to remove all traffic "buttons" on highways throughout the city, and the city department will remove the buttons in other areas where stop signs will replace the little raised warnings. The buttons do considerable damage to tires, it was observed.

Ex-Army Sergeant Seeks Revenge On Jap Bombers

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 29 (P)—A husky ex-army sergeant whose father and brother were killed at Pearl Harbor looked forward grimly today to retribution against Japan's bombers—as an aerial gunner in the US navy.

"All I want," said Walter Bozarth, 20, of Olympia, Wash., arriving at the naval training station, "is to get a couple of Japs in the sights of my machine gun. That's all I want..."

Bozarth decided to reenter his country's service when the death of the father and brother was reported after the Japanese attack on the Hawaiian Islands.

But although an army veteran, he joined the navy to get "the first crack at the enemy" and to put his skill as an expert machine gunner to the best advantage. He was an army machine gun instructor at Camp Roberts before termination of his three-year enlistment last October.

As an apprentice seaman, Bozarth will receive basic training at the naval station here before he is enrolled in the aviation ordinance school. He's confident he soon will be in aerial action against the Japanese, however—and confident of the outcome.

Navy recruiting officers here said Redmond had applied for enlistment in the navy but had not mentioned previous service. They asked him to appear with a birth certificate and said he had not returned to the office since that time.

Senate Passes Big Navy Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (P)—The senate passed today and returned to the house for action on amendments legislation to authorize construction of 1709 minor naval vessels at an estimated cost of \$3,150,000,000.

The measure would also authorize expenditure of \$750,000,000 for construction and ordnance facilities.

Chairman Walsh (D-Mass.) of the senate naval committee said the new ships would be used for convoy and shore patrol work.

GUS WORKS OUT

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (P)—Gus Lesnevich's last workout yesterday for the 10-round bout in which the world light heavyweight boxing champion will meet Bob Pastor tomorrow night in Madison Square garden was held in private.

The doors of the gym were barred as Lesnevich went through a final hard drill that featured seven rounds of sparring. The secrecy was ordered by the champion's handlers, without explanation.

Transportation News

REVISIONS OF S. P. SCHEDULES LISTED

A roundup of recent changes in Southern Pacific passenger schedules and service was revealed Wednesday.

Changes listed by the railroad included:

Withdrawal for the winter months of the streamlined Noon Daylight between Los Angeles and San Francisco to permit overhauling; withdrawal of the Sunset Limited between San Francisco and New Orleans (the schedule between Los Angeles and New Orleans is being continued); daily streamline service between San Francisco and Los Angeles will be continued on both Morning Daylight and the San Joaquin Daylight by day and overnight Lark; a slight alteration in schedules in the San Joaquin Daylight; discontinuation of the Shasta between Dunsmuir and Grants Pass.

The SP has also discontinued stewardess service on all trains because registered nurses are urgently needed in government service.

Because of increased cost of food and service, the railroad has announced slight advances in meal prices on economy trains such as the Beaver (San Francisco to Portland); Coaster (San Francisco to Los Angeles); Californian (Chicago to Los Angeles) and San Francisco Challenger (San Francisco to Chicago).

HEARING CANCELLED ON VALLEY TRAINS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29 (P)—Cancellation of a joint hearing to consider the Southern Pacific railroad's request to abandon passenger train service between southern Oregon towns and Dunsmuir, Calif., was announced last night by the state railroad commission.

The California and Oregon commissions had scheduled the hearing for Yreka on February 9, but cancelled it to comply with the army's request that there be no public hearings on rail service curtailment which might reveal military information.

GRANTS PASS, Jan. 29 (P)—Josephine county representatives who joined in an interstate protest to suspension of Southern Pacific passenger service from the Rogue river valley to California are withdrawing their objection, Charles R. Cooley said yesterday.

"Our formal protest asked only that some impartial regulatory authority determine

whether the suspension of service was necessary because of the national emergency," Cooley said. "Now that has been done and the precedence of emergency requirements declared."

TWO MORE PLEDGE DAYS SLATED HERE

Two more special pledge days for defense savings are scheduled for Saturday and Monday, County Chairman Andrew M. Collier announced Thursday.

Special booths and extra help will be set up for these days at the banks, the Federal Savings and Loan association, county clerk's office and chamber of commerce.

Collier said that he believes there are large numbers of people who did not have an opportunity to sign pledges on bond pledge day, January 20, to show what bonds they are buying or intend to buy. For that reason, he said, a special appeal is being made to bring people in on next Saturday or Monday.

Crew of Norse Tanker Rescued

BOSTON, Jan. 29 (P)—Rescue of the entire crew of 28 of a Norwegian tanker, torpedoed off Nova Scotia January 21, was reported today by the Gloucester schooner Grand Marshal upon her arrival from the fish banks.

Captain Frank Hines, who has himself survived the sinking of two fishing vessels, related that the Grand Marshal came upon the tanker's crew, in two life boats, January 23, about 60 miles off shore. The men, all in good condition except one who suffered an ankle injury, were taken aboard and landed at Shelburne, N. S.

STILL TO QUIT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (P)—Mayor Fiorello La Guardia of New York saw President Roosevelt today and indicated afterward he still intended to quit as civilian defense director but he left it in doubt whether he would devote full time to being mayor or give that up also to enter the army.
