CAPITAL PARASITES DRAW FIRE OF F. R.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (AP) — President Roosevelt declared today that there were many unneeded persons in the national capital and he recommended that Washington newspapers carry a story about it with large headlines reading:

"Are you a parasite?" He made the suggestion in discussing the need for removing persons non-essential to the war effort to make room here for thousands of people who are needed.

The defense housing coordinator, Charles F. Palmer has told him, he said, that non-essential persons should be asked to move, and the chief executive recalled that he had power to take over hotels or other dwellings or even small residences if that drastic step should be required.

The type of person who should move, Mr. Roosevelt indicated, is the one who likes to live here for social reasons, or because children are here in school or who occupies a 20-room home on fashionable Massachusetts avenue.

Back in World war days, when he was assistant navy secretary, Mr. Roosevelt said conditions were similar and a lot of people had come to Washington—many of them friends of his—to have a good time. They didn't do a lick of work, he added, and actually clogged up the war work of the government.

John Day River Floods Farmland In Grant County

PENDLETON, Jan. 30 (AP) — Flood damage continues to mount in Grant county with most ranches bordering the John Day river and its tributaries under one to two feet of water yesterday.

Many farm buildings were isolated in the Canyon City district and stock had been moved to higher ground.

One section of the new bridge across the middle fork of the John Day river has capsized and a swinging bridge normally 20 feet above water has been carried away. Several secondary roads have been washed out.

Naval Recruiter Transferred to Astoria Office

Chief Gunners Mate F. J. McDonald, who has served as navy recruiting officer here since the opening of the station January 1, 1941, has been transferred to Astoria and will take over his duties there the first of the week. McDonald will be relieved by a man named Duncan from Walla Walla, Wash.

McDonald has enlisted 160 men in the United States navy since the local station became a permanent branch of the recruiting division on July 1, 1941. Headquarters are in the federal building.

DANCE TO AID WAR AGAINST POLIO PLAGUE

"Another great Birthday Ball! A grand time for the most merciful cause today, where your dollar may save a life, or make a fine boy walk normally again." This is the slogan of the committee for the observance of the Presidents birthday.

Medical history states that infantile paralysis was so called and discovered in 1840 by a doctor named Von Heine, but it was ignored and not particularly prevalent until 1887 when Dr. Medin drew attention to its ravages in Germany. Another 20 years elapsed before the disease again raised its head, this time in New York City at the rate of nearly 4000 cases—many fatal, still more hopelessly crippled. For some peculiar reason United States and Canada have shown more cases than the rest of the world and in the U. S. alone there were 7130 deaths in 1916. By 1925 the death rate was cut to 1519, but still nothing much was accomplished in curbing the after effects of the dread disease until Nurse Kenny's ideas began to be put into practice. Instead of the tortuous iron brace she propounded the theory of hot compresses and massage, the only system up to date that has solved the problem of the heart-breaking results of the disease—the crippled-for-life.

Brophy Says Unions Hoping to Bury Hatchet—in Enemy

PORTLAND, Jan. 30 (AP) — The AFL and CIO hope to bury the hatchet of their own inter-union enmity in the common enemy, John Brophy, CIO national director, said today. Brophy stopped here en route to Bend to address the state CIO convention.

Cooperation between the rival labor groups and between labor and management is growing, as all elements work toward greater production of war materials, Brophy said.

Questioned as to the possibility of a CIO-AFL merger Brophy replied: "What we have been getting now is unity on essentials. The AFL and the CIO are cooperating in the production effort and have pledged jointly to avoid strikes and have agreed to use machinery available for settling of any disputes that may come up."

Brophy flayed prejudice in hiring either by employers or by unions with closed shop contracts—"We've got to eliminate those prejudiced to get national unity."
