Mack served as president of the state assessors' association in 1941, has been president of the state junior chamber of commerce, and is widely known in democratic and public officials' circles throughout the state.

Modernization Praised

Tax authorities have been quoted as considering his office here as outstanding in the state. Mack has devoted considerable effort to modernization, and in his tenure the 10-year continuous roll system as instituted here, to be adopted subsequently by many other counties.

While Mack was mum about his future plans, his announcement directs immediate public attention upon them. It is known that he has considered going into the farming business in this county (he was raised on the Klamath county farm of his father, Charles Mack) and it has been reported he has had opportunity to take a position with the state tax commission.

Other Races

Not overlooked in conjecture about Mack's future is the fact he has laid political groundwork for seeking other elective office. Mentioned in this connection are congressman and secretary of state, both of which positions are to be filled at this year's elections.

No one has yet announced for the democratic nomination for secretary of state. For congressman, the veteran Walter M. Pierce is back in there again. Perhaps there is something significant in the fact that Mack, now in his early thirties, has had political success in tackling one veteran democratic officeholder. But if Mack has any intention of running for either secretary of state or congress, he would not say so Friday.

Nor has there been a hint of any candidacy for the office Mack now holds, among either republicans or democrats. Now that the announcement is out, however, it won't be necessary to wait for the late Klamath spring for ambitions to sprout. Potential candidates will be getting ideas by the time this is read.

"We are invincible because we have one thing—confidence in our own strength."

Outlining the advantages and disadvantages of being a "young nation," Goebbels said that it was easy for older political systems to weather adversity but that national socialism still was so young that the people have not yet developed full confidence.

The chief advantage of a young nation, he said, lies in the fact that it meets its problems with "sound realism without being overburdened by considerations of tradition."

Dutch Fleet Hit
In an English-language propaganda broadcast, Imperial Tokyo headquarters asserted that Japanese naval planes had "virtually annihilated" the Dutch Indies fleet—two NEI cruisers sunk, a third heavily damaged—in an attack on the Java sea, south of Macassar strait.

Both Washington and London have previously discounted such Japanese claims as extravagant. Moreover, observers pointed out that even with crippling blows to her cruiser force, the Indies still presumably had a powerful striking weapon in destroyers and submarines.

The Tokyo communique also asserted that a United States cruiser of the 7030-ton marble-head type had been badly damaged and another 5000-ton ship sunk.

In Washington, the navy department said it had "no information here" on the Japanese claim of a US cruiser damaged in the Java sea attack, which took place Feb. 4, the day after the mass Japanese air raid on Soerabaya naval base.

The Java sea lies between Borneo and the island of Java, headquarters of Gen. Sir Archibald P. Wavell's united nations command in the southwest Pacific.

In the seven-day-old siege of Singapore, British guns thundered defiance to Japanese troops massed across the mile-wide strait of Johore while RAF Hurricane fighters battled rising sun planes in the skies overhead.

Yesterday's civilian air-raid casualties in the beleaguered island citadel were 14 killed and 104 wounded, making a three-day toll of 77 dead and 332 injured.

Four alarms sounded in Singapore before 9 a. m., indicating that the Japanese were now violently assaulting the fortress city as the prelude to "zero hour" for an invasion attempt.

Congress Disputes Retirement Bill After Passage

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Congressmen already are disputing among themselves over whether they want the two-weeks-old law providing pensions for retired senators and representatives.

Several members of the senate say the law is a blunder and ought to be repealed. In the house there was both support and criticism of the measure which has become the butt of bundles-for-congress ridicule.

Chairman Ramspeck (D-Ga.) of the house civil service committee said he wrote the provision into the civil service bill which the president signed Jan. 26 "at the request of numerous members" and had no apologies to make.

The law opens federal retirement benefits to members of congress. Ramspeck declared there was no reason legislators should not be allowed pensions the same as other government employees.

The 15 Japanese men rounded up Wednesday on Bainbridge island in Puget sound, not far from the Bremerton, Wash., navy yard, will be brought before an alien hearing board to determine if they are to be interned.

102 ALIENS SIGN UP IN KLAMATH

Klamath residents whose nationalities listed them as enemy aliens registered at the local postoffice during the week, the total number at noon Friday reported as 102. Aliens 14 years and over, of German, Japanese and Italian blood, were registered on order of the federal government.

Late Friday postal authorities said there had been no Japanese aliens registered, but German aliens registered five to one as compared to Italian persons.

Deadline was set for 5 p. m. Monday, February 9.

President Favors Congressmen Who Back Government

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt told a press conference today that when the country is at war, we want congressmen who, regardless of party, will back up the United States government and have a record of backing it up regardless of party.

In that manner Mr. Roosevelt let it be known that he probably would view favorably the reelection of most incumbents in the senate and house, although he did not say whether the demarcation line of support would be drawn partly by voting records before Pearl harbor. Congress has acted with almost unbroken unanimity since the war began.

The president made his statement when asked for comment on a recent speech by Edward J. Flynn, democratic national chairman, which expressed the opinion that election of a congress hostile to the administration would be equivalent to a major military disaster.

Seattle Digs Up Horse Traffic Rules For Use if Needed

SEATTLE, Feb. 6 (AP)—It sounds like legal horseplay, but city officials are unearthing the restrictions and privileges of a horse on Seattle streets.

The search was instituted because of fears that horse power might have to be substituted for gasoline power in trucking activities as tires wear out.

Legal research uncovered these regulations:

"No person shall ride or drive any horse or horses at a greater speed than six miles per hour in the downtown area nor more than four miles per hour across any street intersection or around corners nor more than 12 miles elsewhere in the city.

"All persons must hold reins in hands while riding or driving a horse."

If worse comes to worse, and they run out of horses as well as tires, "it shall be unlawful for any person to drive a yoke of oxen on First or Second avenues at faster than a walk."

Herb Owen, Well Known Promoter, Dies at Eugene

EUGENE, Feb. 6 (AP)—Herb Owen, 57, sports promoter in Eugene for the past 15 years, died this morning in a local hospital after being seriously ill following a stroke here last week. Owen also promoted athletic events in other sections of the state, and until his death was wrestling promoter in Portland and at Salem.

Owen, in his youth, was an outstanding athlete, competing for Puget Sound university (now College of Puget Sound), Multnomah Amateur Athletic club in Portland, and Willamette university. In 1906 he was selected all-northwest collegiate quarterback while playing at Willamette under Coach Boyer.

He is survived by his widow, two sons, one daughter, and four grandchildren. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Herb Owen was well known in Klamath Falls as a promoter of boxing and wrestling here a decade ago when matches were staged in the Legion hall before the Klamath Falls army was built.

German Radio Seized in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Feb. 6 (AP)—Brazilian authorities seized a powerful short wave radio transmitter in the German embassy building today in what was declared the first step of a drive to smash a web of wildcat radios operating throughout Brazil for communication with axis ships and directly with Berlin.

A United States embassy source said location of other secret radios in northeast Brazil was known to Brazilian authorities and that they too would be seized immediately.
