

LEGION AUXILIARY PLANS FOR PEACE

What is ahead for America after the war?

While devoting its endeavors to strengthening America against war danger, the American Legion auxiliary is also working to bring a happy answer to that question, according to Mrs. Paul Otterbein, Americanism chairman of the local auxiliary.

The auxiliary sees the solution in good citizenship and is striving to promote interest in citizenship training for both young people and adults. With intelligent citizens whose understanding theory and practice of the democratic form of government, the problems which peace will bring can be solved satisfactorily and America can go forward to better conditions than it ever before has known, the auxiliary believes.

"The economic life of our country is now geared to war and is becoming more so every day," said Mrs. Otterbein. "The readjustment to conditions of peace is bound to bring very difficult problems. Leadership and citizenship of the highest type will be needed to solve these problems and to continue America's advance. Without this there will be danger that the country may seek an easy way out of the difficulties through some form of radicalism that would lead to disaster."

"That is why the auxiliary is giving increased emphasis to its Americanism work, which is the teaching of the principles of democracy to both young and old. We need good citizens now and we will need them in the future. We must maintain a citizenship wholeheartedly devoted to democracy and capable of making the democratic processes work under all conditions."

"Through the many phases of its Americanism program, the auxiliary is carrying forward this work every day. We need the support of every eligible woman in this big effort. We are now enrolling members and I am hoping that all women of World War families will enroll with us. In the auxiliary they can work today for the future of America after the war."

SURVEY SEEKS TO SPEED COLLEGES

EUGENE, Feb. 13—A survey has been launched by the state system of higher education under the supervision of Professor E. B. Lemon, chairman of the high school relationships committee, to ascertain the number of high school students who would be interested in commencing their collegiate work at the beginning of the summer term, it has been announced by the chancellor's office.

This work is being carried on in cooperation with Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction. If sufficient interest is shown by graduating high school seniors, efforts will be made to offer satisfactory beginning programs for these students.

Preliminary plans have already been completed by the state system for streamlining its educational program to meet war emergency conditions for spring and summer months. With the exception of the medical school, the spring term programs of the several institutions will be accelerated by approximately two weeks with all of the commencement exercises scheduled prior to June 1. As a result of the elimination of spring vacation and the condensing of the examination periods, approximately 7500 students will be released 10 to 15 days early and will be made available for emergency labor on farms and in industry.

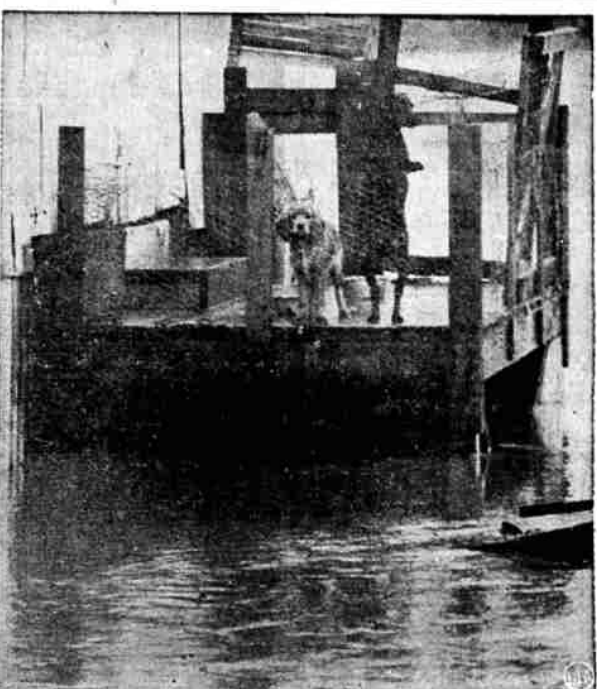
CANADIAN PROVINCES

RAILROADS FORM DEFENSE GROUP

A meeting of Great Northern and Oregon, California and Eastern railway employees was held in the waiting room of the Great Northern station Thursday night, in order to effect organization of a defense unit in line with the program set up by Governor Sprague for major emergency and national defense.

J. W. Weeks, who has been named chairman for the two railroads, presided and named the necessary committees: protective division, police, G. F. Gordon, chairman; T. J. Towey, captain; fire debris clearance, demolition, F. R. Silliman; rescue, first aid, evacuation, V. J. Josephson; air raid precautions, W. A. Garrett; air craft observers, Dr. E. D. Lamb; utilities division, electrical, C. R. Johnson; water and fuel, H. C. Sander; communications division, telephone and telegraph, S. Q. Salisbury; transportation, L. L. LaFountain; planning division, morale, W. F. Hallinan; publicity, F. X. Sexton; registration, W. M. Shedd.

A. F. Condrey, rail traffic coordinator for Klamath Falls and adjacent territory addressed the meeting outlining the plans made up by the governor's organization for the protection of public utilities in the event of a disaster. The schedule adopted calls for meeting every two weeks, each committee chairman to organize his own committee and report to Chairman Weeks at stated intervals.
