

FRANCIS OLDS DIES SUDDENLY AT HOME HERE

Mrs. Olds, a sister of Mrs. Ruth Bathiany, a sister of Mr. Olds, were in Grants Pass Thursday, and returned home by auto Thursday evening an hour or two after the death of the state game commissioner.

Mr. Olds was born at Hood River, Ore., July 6, 1882, the son of Rev. A. R. Olds, a pioneer minister and circuit rider. He came to Klamath Falls in 1907 from Walla Walla, and lived here for 35 years.

In Business Here

For many years he and his brother, Earl Olds, now deceased, were in the paint and wallpaper business in Klamath Falls. Mr. Olds served in the World War, and was a captain in the officers' reserve. For the past several years he had been manager of the extensive Rufus Moore estate.

From 1927 to 1930, Mr. Olds served as a member of the city council. For many years he was on the city park board, and held that position at the time of his death.

His appointment as a member of the state game commission by Governor Charles A. Sprague on February 25, 1941, came as a result of many years of intense interest in conservation, hunting and fishing. He was president of the Cascade Lakes Protective association, and held offices in the Isaac Walton league, Sportsmen's association and Gun club. His companions on hunting and fishing trips describe him as a representative of the highest type of sportsman. On the game commission he took a keen interest in fish propagation and planting, and scientific game management.

Mr. Olds was a member of the Rotary club and had 15 years' perfect attendance.

Survivors include his wife, Marjorie; his sister, Mrs. Harry W. (Ruth) Bathiany, city treasurer; three step-children, Mrs. Robert (Elizabeth) O'Sullivan of Klamath Falls; Patricia Gallagher, student at Whitman college, Walla Walla, Wash., and Robert Gallagher of Prineville. The latter two were expected here Friday.

At the request of the family following a recent desire expressed by Mr. Olds, friends are asked not to send flowers to the services.

The remains are at the Earl Whitlock funeral home, and funeral arrangements will be announced later by Whitlock's.

Ace German Propagandist Found Guilty

WASHINGTON, March 6 (UP)—George Sylvester Viereck, novelist, publicist, poet and ace German propagandist, last night was found guilty of violating provisions of the foreign agent registration act.

The verdict was returned by a federal court jury of 10 men and two women who took the case under advisement at 2:30 p. m., after Prosecutor William Power Maloney denounced the defendant as "the mouthpiece of the murderous lying rogues in the Wilhelmstrasse."

Viereck—registered with the state department as an agent of the German library of information and a Munich (Germany) newspaper—faces a maximum penalty of two to six years, a \$2000 fine, or both. His counsel said he will appeal.

He was indicted specifically for failing to report all his propaganda activities to the state department.

Viereck showed no emotion as the jury was polled and each member intoned a "guilty as indicted." His wife, standing nearby, also was calm as the verdict was delivered.

Big names paraded through both government and defense testimony, among them the late Sen. Lundeen (R., Md.), former Sen. Rush D. Holt, (D-W. Va.) and Rep. Hamilton Fish, (R-NY).

Bombs Dropped Near Honolulu Reported Those of Japanese

HONOLULU, March 5 (UP)—An army announcement today said that examination of the fragments of bombs dropped on the outskirts of Honolulu early Wednesday morning had confirmed that the bombs were dropped by a Japanese plane.

The fragments were identified by army ordnance experts as being from Japanese bombs. Four bombs were dropped, apparently by a single plane, but they hit in an open area and did no damage.

The army had announced yesterday after several hours of investigation that the explosions which awoke Honoluluans early Wednesday were caused by bombs believed to have been dropped by an enemy plane.

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sieged, and under a permanent alert against air raids.

There is on all sides the smell of burning paper as government offices and businesses, some only recently arrived from Batavia, destroy their files in preparation for the worst.

Jogjakarta, with a population of about 130,000 Indonesians and 6000 Europeans, lies in middle eastern Java less than 15 miles from the island's south coast.

These were but two of the places which the communiques conceded lost to the foe.

On the credit side of the defenders, however, was a report that a point previously lost to the Japanese had been regained by a Dutch attack today. Evidently this town—not at once identified—was on the arc of invasion 25 miles north of Bandoeng.

Bandoeng, now the focus of defense, heard artillery fire today, perhaps from one of the three regions of penetration to its north; Poerwakarta to the north and west, Kalidjati to the north and Soebang to the north and east. It may be one of these places which the Dutch regained.

Aneta, authoritative Dutch news agency, said it was reliably learned tonight that all NEI forces—and, presumably, any of their British, Australian and American allies that were with them, had withdrawn from a great section of western Java, leaving it to the invader.

Bandoeng, 60 airline miles southeast of Batavia, in the fastness of the Praeger plateau with its towering volcanic peaks, was seen as the center of the next phase of the war. It is the temporary capital of the NEI headquarters of the Dutch army and site of Java's young war industries.

Rommel Reported Talking to Hitler

CAIRO, March 6 (AP)—Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, commander of the axis African army which has been stalemated for several weeks in the Libyan desert by the combination of British forces and bad weather, has left North Africa to confer with Adolf Hitler, it was reported today.

These reports, which coincided with information in diplomatic quarters here, said that Rommel had departed on Feb. 26, and that simultaneously the Nazi military attaché in Turkey had left Ankara to attend the same conference.

Berlin Reports Americans Held

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts) March 6 (AP)—German dispatches from Shanghai said today a number of prominent United States and British citizens, including newspaper correspondents and business men, had been arrested by the Japanese in Shanghai.

The arrests were described as reprisals for the treatment of Japanese in the United States.

Germans Claim 12 More Ships Sunk

BERLIN, (FROM GERMAN BROADCASTS), March 6 (AP)—German submarines have sunk 12 more ships totaling 82,500 tons in North and Central American waters, the high command announced today in a special communique.

The ships sunk include a large United States destroyer and seven large tankers, the announcement said.
