FAVORED STOCK ISSUES MANAGE SLIGHT CLIMB

NEW YORK, March 7 (AP)—Selected stocks got a finger-hold on recovery in today's market despite persistent unsatisfactory war news and apprehension over taxes.

While minus signs were plentiful at the close, modest gains were well distributed in most departments. Numerous issues were unchanged.

Transfers of around 300,000 shares were the largest for a Saturday since early January.

Among stocks, steels, motors, rails, oils, coppers and specialties were the first to reverse the downward course and most retained improvement to the finish.

Attracting support were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Standard Oil (N.J.), Anaconda, International Nickel, Goodrich, United Aircraft, Du Pont, American Telephone and International Harvester.

In the backward division were Coca-Cola, Liggett & Myers "B", Allied Chemical, Johns-Manville and Goodyear.

GRAIN PRICES FADE UNDER NEWS CLOUD

CHICAGO, March 7 (AP)—Grain prices lost fractions today as the market suffered from lack of trading incentive due to war news and the prolonged wait for congressional action on the farm bloc move to halt government sales of wheat and corn at prices below parity.

The market's sluggishness was a counterpart of the slow milling and commercial trade as most interests, farmers to consumers, awaited developments.

Wheat dipped about 1 cent at one time but closed unchanged to 1/2 cent lower compared with yesterday, May \$1.298-1.291, July \$1.301. Corn, off with wheat, rallied on late short covering to close 1/4 cent higher than yesterday, May \$0.81, July \$0.80-0.81. Oats finished 1/8 down; rye unchanged to 1/8 off and soy beans unchanged to 1/2 cent lower.

NEWSPAPER RIGHT UPHELD BY COURT

ALBANY, N. Y., March 7 (AP)—A newspaper's right to hold legislators "to the strictest official accountability" was declared Friday by the appellate division, New York supreme court, in dismissing a complaint of Rep. Edwin A. Hall (R-N.Y.) against the Binghamton Press company.

Hall's suit for \$75,000 was based on editorials published Feb. 10, 11 and 12 last year, criticizing his vote against the lend-lease bill approved by congress.

Presiding Justice James P. Hill said in a majority opinion "national legislators who participate in the formation of governmental policies should be held to the strictest accountability."

"This is promoted through free exercise of the right to criticize officials acts. The people furnish legislators with an extensive and expensive secretariat and give them the right to use the mails at public expense."

"With these opportunities of personal praise and propaganda, opposition newspapers and editorial writers should not be limited to weak, tepid and supine criticism and discussion."

Judge Hill added "it is not disgraceful or odious" for a congressman to vote contrary to the wishes of his constituents if he thinks he is right.

Judge Sydney F. Foster in a dissenting opinion said the editorials were "susceptible to a libelous meaning" and should have been submitted to a jury.

CARPENTRY CLASSES FOR ARMY STARTED

Two classes in cantonment carpentry have been started for men who wish to take a short course qualifying them for jobs on Medford and Corvallis army camp construction projects, Defense Coordinator A. H. Fitch announced Friday. The classes are being held in Klamath Union high school quarters and are of 12 weeks duration, Fitch said. However, many men may be called sooner depending on their past experience, he said. Fitch said the course is not designed for training men for general carpentry but only for specialized units such as nailing siding, framing, flooring and other specific jobs. Related work is given in blueprint reading, rafter cutting, nailing, types of saws and other classes of information which may be needed. Those interested were asked to contact Fitch at the defense office in the high school or anyone at the United States employment office at 242 Main street.
