



The huge knot is held in the picture by William Hurn, son of the pioneer. As Klamath Agency farmer, the elder Hurn was in charge of a trail-blazing crew in 1898 which laid out the present Sprague River road. He found a growing pine tree which had been tied in a single knot by some passing traveler. The tree had grown with that knot in its trunk for some years. Hurn took it home and made a table with the knotted trunk as the center leg. It was recently brought from the Hurn basement, where for many years it had been stored.


