Completion last fall of the 8.3 miles of construction between park headquarters and Kerr Notch by way of the south side route has been announced by E. P. Leavitt, super itendent of Crater Lake national park. The completion of this section makes the rim road a modern standard highway for its entire length. In addition to the rock surfacing and bituminous surface treatment placed on the roadway, crushed rock material is also manufactured and inck-piled under this contract for use in constructing a per-panent bituminous paving on tion at a later date.

This surfacing project construction was directed by the US public roads administration in cooperation with the national park service under Contractor Sem Orino at a cost of \$122,000. A portion of the highway be-

tween Annie springs and the rim for a distance of five miles was also improved with a bituminous application and rock chip cover during the late fall months of 1941. This work, at a cost of \$10,000, was contract-ed to G. J. Eldon of Portland, Oregon. The expenditures for road construction and improvement in the park now amount to about four and one-half miln dollars.

t is contemplated that the transfer pattern of 20 motifs entire park highway system will be kept in good condition for the duration of the present war emergency. These highways now afford quick and safe driving access to the lake from all sides of the park and around the rim of the lake to the many parking points which have been provided for viewing the lake and surrounding country. Trails lead-ing to special points of interest will also be kept available as

The present policy of the na-tional park service is to keep the parks open during the war for the pleasure and enjoyment of the public, realizing that the parks offer much in spiritual, scenic and recreational values needed by hard working citizens in their efforts to win the war in their efforts to win the war in afford a welcome relief from the cares and worries of the daily job and usual environment. Special service and at-tention is given to men in uniform who visit the parks.
