WAR REPORTS PUT CLAMP ON STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, March 10 (AP)—The stock market tried for specialized recoveries today but persistent unsatisfactory war news restricted buying support in many instances.

Transfers were around 350,000 shares. Coppers did fairly well from the start. Scattered rails, aircrafts, motors and specialties back on occasions plus signs although advances here were in some cases. An assortment of blue chips showed losses of 1 to about 4 points at the close.

U. S. Steel and Bethlehem slipped in afternoon dealings without being subjected to much pressure. There were a number of new lows for the past year. A few pivots posted 4-year bottoms.

In the drooping class most of the day were Dow Chemical, Eastman Kodak, Dupont, Union Carbide, Philip Morris, Liggett and Myers "B," Sears Roebuck, US Steel, Bethlehem, Standard Oil (N. J.) and Goodrich.

GRAINS GIVE UP EARLY INCREASES

CHICAGO, March 10 (AP)—Realizing sales and drying up of demand forced grain futures to surrender much of the early sharp price gains today.

Failure of the president to make direct reference to pending farm legislation that would prohibit government sales of surplus wheat and corn at less than parity prices was the chief reason for the early upturn. Later, however, some traders expressed the opinion that the general import of his address left little doubt as to his position regarding present prices of farm commodities.

Extreme gains in wheat and soybeans amounted to 1 1/2 cents, but later the bread cereal grain was reduced by more than half and at times soybeans gave up all but 1 cent of the advance. Prices firmed again toward the close although most grains were confined to minor fractions. Wheat closed 1 to 1 1/2 cents higher than Monday's final levels.
