Klamath county topped its \$100,000 share of the \$50,000,000 national fund early in February. EDUCATION HELD VITAL TO DEFENSE

"Education in Americanism is a vital part of the defense of the nation, said Mrs. Paul Otterbein, Americanism chairman of Klamath unit of the American Legion auxiliary, presenting plans for the auxiliary's 1942 work in the field.

"As we fight for the defense of democracy, we must teach the principles of democracy more effectively than ever before," Mrs. Otterbein stated. "Young and old alike must know exactly what our free form of government means to them, and how it gives them advantages they could not enjoy under any other form of rule.

"The foreign born must be trained in citizenship and taught how to be real Americans. Citizenship duties must be understood by everyone so that these will be performed willingly and effectively. Devotion to America must be strong that service to the country will be joyfully given and sacrifices for victory gladly made."
