Women Expected To Take Defense Work in Plants

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—An official survey of the nation's human resources declared Tuesday that millions of women would have to be shifted from housework to munitions factories in the expansion of war industries.

The survey was made by the bureau of census. It contained no specific mention of proposals that American women be drafted into factories as women are in England, but asserted:

"The maximum movement into the male labor force can hardly exceed 2,000,000 men. A larger expansion of the total labor supply evidently can be achieved only by drawing millions of women into the labor force."

The report said that 25,600,000 housewives between 18 and 44 years old represented the principal reserve from which additional war labor might be drawn.

"An enormous amount of manpower will be needed for replacing workers withdrawn into the armed forces and for expanding the output of war materials," it stated.

The report acknowledged that many women were prevented from taking jobs by family responsibilities, but said flatly: "The groups from which most of the additional workers must be drawn are the women engaged in home housework or not in the labor force for other reasons."
