Birth Certificate Requests Flood Statistics Office

Conclusive evidence of American citizenship, which is of major importance to thousands living in this country today, is being sought from government agencies which have been flooded with applications since the declaration of war, December 8.

The Oregon state board of health, which considered itself snowed under if it received as many as 200 applications for delayed certificates of birth within a single year, now receives at least 200 applications in a single morning's work for the registration staff of the board's vital statistics division in Portland.

A uniform procedure for the issuance of delayed birth certificates was worked out by the federal census bureau, according to Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, Klamath county health officer, and its adoption was urged upon the states in April of last year. The manual recommended that delayed certificates be issued on the basis of records established before the fourth birthday of the registrant, or three independent records issued on or after the fourth birthday or at least five years prior to the date when application is made.

Also given was a list of the types of evidence in the order of preference including hospital record, physician's record, record from a census, Bible record, church or school, insurance policy, army, navy or marine discharge, other types of documents such as driver's license, marriage or voting registration record and affidavit of physician or "interested" party.
