NEW VALUE FOUND IN OLD MEDICINE

CHICAGO, March 12 — In a cheap, 30-year-old medicine, the University of Illinois Medical college has discovered a potent remedy for premature births.

The medicine is a hormone extract from the corpora lutea of sows. It has been used for years for the nausea of expectant mothers, but the life-saving potency went unrecognized.

This extract costs about 40 cents an ampoule, a little glass tubefull, compared with about \$1.25 for the other premature birth remedy. The latter might cost \$150 if given throughout pregnancy, while the inexpensive one would be less than \$25.

Furthermore, the low cost medicine appears to be just as effective. Its development is reported by Dr. F. H. Falls, professor of obstetrics and gynecology and head of the department.

The 40-cent remedy, used in Cook County hospital here on 300 cases of threatened premature births, saved 80 per cent of the babies. At the same time, in 50 similar cases not given the extract, 60 per cent of the mothers lost their babies.

Practically identical results were obtained in 200 cases treated in the same way at the Research and Educational hospital of the University of Illinois.

This medicine, however, does much more. It has stopped premature labor. It has helped to control hemorrhage in a condition known as ablatio placenta, which kills unborn babies. It has also delayed hemorrhage from another serious complication, placenta previa, until the babies developed sufficiently so that they could be taken by caesarean operation.

Dr. Falls said the indications are that the extract may contain an unknown hormone. The existence of this substance may have been masked for years by the fact that the corpora lutea, source of the extract, produces also a well known hormone, progesterone. After its discovery progesterone was synthesized by chemists, who made it from soy beans.

This synthetic product had the same chemical formula as the natural progesterone and should have been as effective for premature birth. But it was not. That unusual circumstance led Dr. Falls to suspect that some other, unknown hormone, was the potent factor.
