

SMALL BUYERS BRING RISE IN STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—Small buyers were more than a match for most timid sellers in today's stock market, especially in steels, motors and specialties, and the result was a selectively higher price shift.

The list began to strengthen in spots after a hesitant start and gains ranged from fractions to 2 points or so when the going was good. Closing quotations were under the peaks in most cases and declines were plentiful.

Transfers for the five hours approximated 350,000 shares.

Supported stocks included US Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, Western Union, Dow Chemical, Dupont, Philip Morris, Kennecott and Standard Oil (N. J.)

Notwithstanding the generally resistant tone, a number of new 4-year lows were in evidence. Backward the greater part of the time were Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical and American Telephone.

Bonds were in arrears and commodities uneven.

GRAINS RALLY TO RECOVER LOSSES

CHICAGO, March 13 (AP)—Grain prices surrendered most of Thursday's advance today but then rallied to recover losses.

Profit taking and selling inspired by reports that the president may veto legislation which would interfere with the present government program of disposal of ever-normal granary supplies accounted for most of the weakness.

A pause in demand from milling and flour interests permitted wheat to sag although there was some buying credited to these sources later during the rally.

Wheat, off as much as 1c at one time, closed 1c lower to 1c higher compared with yesterday. May \$1.30 1/4, July \$1.32 1/4. Corn 1-1/2c down, May 88c, July 91-90c; oats unchanged to 1c off; rye 1-1/2c lower; soybeans 1-1/2c lower.

Meatless Meals Can Be Sturdy, Well-Balanced

Meatless meals can be nutritionally balanced, economical and interesting. Here are some recipes to prove it.

Scalloped Lima Beans

(Serves 4 to 6)
One and one-half cups dried lima beans, 3 hard-cooked eggs, 1 cup chopped pimiento, 1 cup grated cheese, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 4 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, salt and pepper.

Cover beans with cold water, soak overnight or for several hours and cook until tender in boiling, salted water. Drain. Place half the beans in a baking dish, cover with sliced hard-cooked eggs, and sprinkle with pimiento and cheese. Cook onion in butter for a few minutes.

Savory Rice

(Serves 4 to 6)
One-quarter cup butter, 1 medium-sized onion, 3 tablespoons tomato paste, 1 cup water, No. 2 can (2 cups) tomatoes, 1 teaspoon black pepper, 1 bay leaf, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 cup rice, 1 cup grated cheese.
Melt butter, add thinly sliced

stir in flour, add milk, cook until thick. Season with salt and pepper. Pour half the sauce over beans and eggs, cover with beans, add remaining sauce, and top with grated cheese. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about half an hour, or until the mixture is thoroughly heated and cheese melted and slightly browned.

onion, cook until delicately browned. Add tomato paste mixed with water, canned tomatoes and seasonings, cook slowly for 45 minutes. Cook rice in boiling salted water, drain, add to tomato mixture. Turn into a baking dish, cover with cheese, and bake in hot oven (400 deg. F.), until cheese is well browned.

Noodle Ring

(Serves 4 to 6)
One package noodles, 1 1/2 ta-

blespoons butter, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, pepper, mace, 2 eggs.

Cook noodles in boiling salted water 10 minutes and drain. Make a white sauce of butter, flour and milk. Add salt, a dash of pepper and a pinch of mace or nutmeg. Add beaten eggs and combine with noodles. Turn in to buttered ring mold, set in pan of hot water, and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 40 minutes or until firm. Turn

out onto a hot platter and fill center with creamed fish, eggs, or vegetables.
