

GARBAGE DISPOSAL PLANNED AT DORRIS

DORRIS — Free garbage disposal for all Dorris residences and business establishments was discussed at the March city council meeting Monday, March 9.

The city's newest municipal project would furnish a full-time salaried position as garbage collector to some man with a truck, with an opportunity of feeding hogs and selling junk and scrap iron as a sideline. Proper licenses would have to be obtained by the appointee.

Financing of the project might involve a small tax boost, the council said, but the rise in any case would be much less than the average monthly charge from private concerns. City taxes could not be raised until July, 1942. The present tax rate is \$1.60.

Applicants for the job will be accepted by the council members during the month, with further action to be taken at the April meeting.

Irish Eyes Will Smile At St. Patrick's Pie

Here a pleasing dish for the special party to celebrate St. Patrick's day. Lime chiffon pie, trimmed with shamrocks, makes a dessert to delight the eye and the taste. A touch of green in the menu not only honors the

to egg whites and beat until foamy; then add remaining 4 tablespoons sugar gradually, and continue beating until stiff. Fold slightly thickened gelatin into egg whites. Pour into cold pie shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with whipped cream and peppermint candy shamrocks.

Another cheerful holiday dessert touched with the green of Erin in this Irish Medley:

Irish Medley (Serves 10 to 12)

One package orange-flavored gelatin, 1 pint hot water, 1 cup canned crushed pineapple, drained, 1 cup lady finger or stale cake crumbs, 1 cup cream, whipped, 1 pint hot water, 1 drop all of peppermint.

Dissolve orange-flavored gelatin in 1 pint hot water. Chill when slightly thickened, fold in pineapple. Turn into shallow pan. Chill until firm. Fold lady finger crumbs into cream. Pour over orange-flavored gelatin mixture. Dissolve lime flavored in 1 pint hot water. Add oil of peppermint. Chill until syrupy. Place in bowl and whip ice or ice water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Pour over cream mixture in pan. Chill until firm. Unmold. Cut shamrock shapes with shamrock cutter, cut in squares, or mold in large shamrock mold.

DORRIS—Notices have been sent to the parents of Dorris grammar school pupils, advising them of health clinics to be held at the school March 20 and April 17, beginning at 9 a. m.

Diphtheria immunization shots will be administered at the first clinic March 20, to both pre-school and elementary school children.

Smallpox vaccinations will be offered pre-school and school children of Dorris at the April clinic. Adults may take advantage of the offer also.

A charge of 25 cents per person, to be paid at the time of the clinic, will be made to cover cost of materials.

Parents were urged by the sponsors of the clinics, the state and county departments of health, to take advantage of the disease prevention clinics at this time, as wars are usually accompanied by epidemics.

Lime Shamrock Pie

Three egg yolks, slightly beaten, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup water, 1 package lime-flavored gelatin, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind, dash of salt, 3 egg whites, 1 baked 9-inch pie shell.

Combine egg yolks and 4 tablespoons sugar in top of double boiler, mixing well. Add water and blend. Cook over hot water until mixture coats spoon, stirring constantly. Remove from fire. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice and rind. Chill until slightly thickened. Add salt
