JENKINS SPEAKS AT LAKEVIEW BANQUET

LAKEVIEW — "We folks on the home front must keep an eye on the politicians in order to wage a successful war and to secure a lasting peace" was the key note of the address which Frank Jenkins, Klamath Falls publisher, delivered here Thursday night at a banquet given by the Lakeview chapter of the American Association of University Women. The speaker pointed out that politicians bungled the settlement of the last war and that the collapse of France

was due primarily to the fact that the French politicians and not the French military leaders had been directing the country's war efforts. Jenkins asserted that if we lose this war our politicians will lose it for us and if we lose the peace our politicians will also be responsible.

The evening's program, which was under the direction of Beulah Corbett, consisted of two cornet numbers by Vinton Pope, "We Can Do It Again" and "The Old Refrain." He was accompanied by Miss Betty Jane Rogers. Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Cole entertained with a vocal duet. Their numbers were "America the Beautiful" and "Remember Pearl Harbor."

This was the first annual dinner honoring the husbands of the members.
