

WATER RIGHTS UP FOR DISCUSSION

Arthur W. Schaupp, Klamath Falls attorney, will address and lead a discussion at an open meeting of the Malin grange at Malin, Monday evening, March 23, on the subject of "Water Rights."

There is no subject of more basic importance to every owner of irrigated land than whether he has a property right in the water he must have to raise crops or whether, as the interior department now contends, the ownership of the water is and remains in the federal government, the landowner having only the privilege of purchase from the interior department.

Mr. Schaupp will discuss the legal background of irrigation, both state and federal laws relating to water use and the way those laws have been interpreted by the courts. The meeting will then be thrown open to general discussion of the subject.

The meeting is open to the public, whether members of the grange or not. It will begin promptly at 8 p. m. It is hoped that irrigation landowners from all parts of the county will attend.

California Finds Tourist Business Cut in Half

SAN FRANCISCO, March 17 (AP)—California's \$50,000,000 annual tourist business has been cut approximately in half since the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, it was estimated Monday by Californians Inc.

The promotional organization expressed satisfaction over the fact there has been any tourist business at all in view of the "rumors" throughout the east about danger, attack and terror on the Pacific coast.

These rumors were said to have been caused by "publicity-seeking interviews, fertile imaginations, enemy inspiration and self-dramatizing letters."

There was no exodus from San Francisco, either of the populace or of tourists already here, the organization said.
