Gralapp explained that the de fense training program is now laid out in such a way that train-ing study in various courses is to be rewar be rewarded with the award

For instance, messengers will take the following work: Basic subject, 22 hours.

First aid, 10 hours. Fire defense, 1 hour. Gas defense, 2 hours. General course, 5 hours. Drill, 2 hours.

Courses in 16 divisions have been developed. After the hours have been earned, an insignia and federal recognition is given the defense worker.

#### Jap Supply Lines Weak, Says Chinese




