

LOCAL PLATOON OF AMBULANCE CORPS FORMED

Women's place in Oregon's civilian defense plan was augmented Wednesday night when the Oregon Women's Ambulance Corps organized a local platoon at a public rally held in the court house. Major Faith M. Goble and Major Alice Traver, regimental headquarters, Portland, organized the group.

The Oregon Women's Ambulance Corps is a volunteer non-profit organization, incorporated under the laws of the state. It is a service organization to complement existing defense agencies and not to compete or duplicate any other group, the organizers stated. The corps works for and with any established agency and finds greatest success with the local defense councils.

Five mandatory courses include, first aid comprised of Red Cross standard and advanced courses and military first aid; motor mechanics, communications, fire fighting, and last but not one of the most important, military drill. This is taught by an ex-service man who serves as drillmaster and military advisor. Drill teaches military courtesy and discipline and speeds coordination, the women outlined in their talk.

The corps is now over one year old and boasts nearly 800 members throughout the state. It operates in 18 cities. The state is divided into three battalions, No. 1 with Major Eleanor Napier in command with headquarters at Seaside; No. 2 with Major Lucille Dyott in command, headquarters in Eugene; No. 3 with Major Edna Rice in command, headquarters in Prineville. Klamath Falls will be the fourth platoon, Company L, Third battalion.

The local platoon will be under command of Acting Second Lieutenant Betty Guernsey and any woman over 18 years of age, a citizen of the United States, in good health and interested in taking training to become an ambulance driver, is invited to contact Mrs. Guernsey for further information. Members provide their own uniforms, a tan cotton gabardine slacks suit at a cost of \$10; pay a registration fee of \$1, and 50 cents a month for dues.

Thirty Klamath women have already signified their intention of enlisting in the ambulance corps. Further information may be obtained by calling Mrs. Guernsey, 4527, or by contacting her in Room 202, IOOF building, regimental headquarters. Major Traver of Portland is a former Klamath Falls girl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Uelings, pioneer residents. She has formed units at Hood River, Silverton, and other Oregon towns and has served for over a year as captain of the corps in Salem.

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TRUCK EQUIPMENT POOLING IS EYED

PORTLAND, March 20 (AP)—Pooling of trucking equipment, may be required soon by the government, Frank E. Landsburg predicted Thursday.

The district director of the Oregon-Washington motor carriers division of the interstate commerce commission said the plan might embrace the logging and agricultural industries.

Logging operators, he said, might be required to "double shift their operations and keep their trucks working" and if one logger has an idle truck it would be placed in the pool of idle equipment.

Landsburg said the limitation of truck quotas would mean that all applications would be considered "in relation to the war effort." He said 950 applications had been received by his office during the first 10 days of the rationing program. This is three times the quota for March in this district.

DARWIN, Australia, March 20 (UP)—Increasing numbers of American soldiers here are getting on well with the Australian comrades except for one thing—the amazing Australian language.

The Americans swear the Australians don't talk English and Australians reciprocate in kind.

And each group insists the other talks too fast.

So great are the difficulties that Col. Robinson, in charge of American forces here, had to telephone Capt. K. O. Preshan, Australian liaison officer, to act as translator when the colonel attempted to question an Australian soldier.

Actually, a United Press correspondent has found, it is possible to learn Australian slang—which forms a large part of most Australian soldier conversation—within a week if one has a good ear and applies one's self.

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CALIFORNIA FINDS CASH DEFICIENCY

SACRAMENTO, March 20 (UP)—California ended February with a general fund cash deficiency of \$8,749,694, an increase of \$358,849 over a month earlier but \$58,743,128 less than on February 28, 1941, State Controller Harry B. Riley announced Wednesday night.

The increase over the January figure, Riley explained, was caused by clearance in January of sales tax and other revenue normally not received until the following month.

During the first eight months of the current fiscal year, state revenues totaled \$149,833,938, including \$96,754,603 in sales taxes. Total revenues for the

eight months increased \$23,257,358 over the corresponding period a year ago while expenditures dropped \$13,572,371 below the \$117,090,721 spent during a similar period in 1940-41.

The state's income during the period exceeded expenditures by \$46,158,162, Riley said.

Promotion Asked For Wainwright

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—Major General Jonathan M. Wainwright, who succeeded General Douglas MacArthur as commander of the beleaguered American and Filipino forces on the Bataan peninsula, was nominated by President Roosevelt today to be a lieutenant general.

Wainwright had been serving as second in command to MacArthur and then took full charge of the defense of the peninsula and forts at the

mouth of Manila bay when MacArthur was ordered to Australia to become supreme commander of United National forces in the southwest Pacific. He is a native of Walla Walla.
