SLOW DRIFTING MARKS MARKET

NEW YORK, March 20 (P)—A slow drifting stock market to-day just about cancelled the brisk MacArthur rally of St. Patrick's day.

The plans of President Schram and the American Federation of Labor for a repeal or revision of the capital gains tax sounded a hopeful note in financial quarters but the attitude of congress on this argument was cloudy enough to hold optimism in abeyance.

Transfers approximated 300,000 shares. Stocks in new low ground for the year included American phone, Homestake Mining and International Harvester.

In the retreating column most of the time were US Steel, Youngstown Sheet, Montgomery Ward, Western Union, American Smelting, DuPont, US Gypsum, Union Carbide, Standard Oil (NJ) and Union Pacific.

Resistant were Dow Chemical, Sperry, Consolidated Aircraft, Texas Co. and Chicago Great Western Preferred.

Bonds were steady, with second grade rails doing fairly well.

FRESH DECLINES HIT GRAIN MARKET

CHICAGO, March 20 (P)—Fresh declines in the grain market today carried prices of leading cereals and soybeans down to near or below the lowest figures quoted so far in 1942 in most cases.

Rye fell almost 2 cents, wheat more than a cent, and corn and oats almost that much, while soybeans at one stage tumbled 6 cents, the maximum loss permitted in one session.

Stop loss selling was blamed for the pronounced weakness of both rye and wheat but the market in general was bearishly affected by lagging demand for most spot delivery grain, except corn.

The favorable prospect for new winter wheat, which will be moving into consumption in about three months, also was a factor.

Wheat closed 1-1/4 cents lower than yesterday, May \$1.23-1/2, July \$1.27-1/2; corn 1-1/2 down, May 87-5/8, July 89-1/2; oats 1-1/2 off; rye 1-1/2 lower; soybeans 5-1/2c lower.
