CHURCHGOERS SEE MOVIES OF SCENIC SWEDEN

On Saturday, March 21, mov ing pictures of Sweden will be shown at the First Covenant church, 823 Walput avenue, The meeting begins at 7:45 p. m. Two reels of the picture, "Se Sweden—The Land and "Scenic People," will be shown. These views will give a comprehensive pictorial tour of the counfrom the farmlands of the south to the forests and streams of Norrland. It also will include airplane views of the deepsea fishing fleet, of Gothenburg haror, of Masthugg church, and of the great power station at Trollhattan. The pictures also display Sweden's modern highways, electrified railroads and air routes

After a brief series of scenes which of-fer a general view of Stockholm and its fine harbor, this film deals with various aspects of the city as seen by an energetic visitor making a stay which extends over both summer and winter, rather than the conventional tourist sights.
