miles from the nearest point of the Indian frontier on the coast of the Bay of Bengal. Allammy is just north across the river from Thayetmyo.

Where the British are going was not divulged in the communiqué, which declared that "our forces are still in the process of taking up their new positions which are now north of Thayetmyo."

The British declared that the latest information on Japanese movements showed that a column on the west bank of the Irrawaddy was located north of Kama, which is 25 miles south of Thayetmyo, and another on the east bank of the river about Nyaungbinzeik, with other elements moving to the northeast up the Sinyok valley.

The Sinyok valley is between the Mandalay-Prome and Mandalay-Toungoo roads.

F. R. Assures Labor Employer Not to Gain

had proposed that for the war's duration individual and family incomes be limited to \$25,000 a year, in return for which labor would accept non-negotiable defense bonds in lieu of all overtime pay for more than 40 hours a week.

Today's UAW-CIO conference of delegates from 600 local unions was called to act on the national CIO's recommendation that double time wages for Sunday and holiday work be waived.

"Not Windfall"
Noting the recommendations of such action by the CIO and AFL, the president's letter added:

"Of course the relinquishment of double time should not operate as a windfall to any employer or group of employees. We are asking sacrifices from no group for the selfish benefit of any other group. Total war demands total sacrifice for the common good."

The UAW-CIO international board presented its proposals for limiting incomes in what it termed an "equality of sacrifice" war program.

Other parts of the program included rigid price fixing on all necessities and limiting war production profits to 3 per cent on capital investment.

JAPANESE STILL IN UNCERTAIN STATUS

Six Japanese awaiting a permit to travel back north rounded out their first week in the Klamath Falls vicinity Tuesday, still uncertain of their status. Latest round in the attempt to obtain an alien travel permit for them came Tuesday morning, when the order permitting them to travel was received here from Portland headquarters, and canceled again before the Japanese could be gotten under way.

The Japanese left the Merrill district voluntarily last Tuesday after residents protested their presence, and have remained in the Klamath Falls district while Sheriff Lloyd Low requested government authorities for a travel permit that would allow them to return to Tacoma. The request has now gone the rounds from Tacoma to San Francisco to Salem to Portland.

M. Kibe, spokesman for the Japanese, Tuesday expressed some concern at the prospect of the trip north. Sheriff Low said. Under the curfew law, aliens are not allowed out between 8 p. m. and 6 a. m., and it will be impossible for the Japanese to travel from here to Tacoma in the 14 hours available to them without making an overnight stop somewhere along the way. They came here from Tacoma in a truck loaded with household goods and belongings.

CHAMBER OUTLINES VIEWS ON ISSUES

Klamath county chamber of commerce has suggested a number of matters for consideration of the national chamber of commerce which meets late this month, touching upon streamlining for the war effort, labor relations, relief of small business in the war emergency, and agricultural labor problems.

"We appreciate the fact that we must make sacrifices, that we cannot conduct business as usual," said the local chamber in a letter to the national organization.

The letter advocates elimination of waste and overlapping of governmental departments in prosecuting the war effort. Registration of able-bodied men out of war draft age to constitute a reserve from which labor could be drawn was suggested in connection with agriculture's labor problem.

Discussing workings of the national labor relations act, the chamber letter states that "our chamber would not have these acts amended to the prejudice of labor, but inasmuch as industry is expected to offer opportunity for labor... we believe the acts should be amended so as to relieve industry but leave labor with all the rights and benefits it should properly have."

Klemme Issues Statement On Congress Candidacy

Marvin Klemme, candidate for the republican nomination for congress from the second district, has issued his campaign statement asserting that if elected he will oppose excess profits to "favored groups (both labor and capital) while our boys are fighting at \$21 per month."

Klemme, a resident of Burns, made the following statement for the Voters pamphlet:

"It is my sincere desire to represent all of the people of eastern Oregon and not just one section of the district or one group. If nominated and elected I pledge myself as follows:

"While not in accord with much of the administration's foreign policy leading up to this war, the matter is no longer an issue. I shall therefore support all measures directed toward a more efficient prosecution of the war, placing the interests of this nation, however, first at all times. I feel that politics should be eliminated completely from the conduct of the war and that the American people are entitled to a more definite statement as to what they are fighting for.

"Eastern Oregon's future prosperity depends almost entirely upon its forests, agricultural and livestock. I will therefore support all measures designed to protect and stabilize these activities.

"Will work for adequate provisions in our immigration laws to meet the present situation. Would favor deportation of most aliens who do not become citizens within five years.

"Will work for federal support in the developing of Oregon's vast mineral resources.

"Will support national legislation authorizing adequate pensions to all needy persons over 60 years of age.

"Will oppose excess profits to favored groups (both labor and capital) while our boys are fighting at \$21.00 per month."

Jap Transports Reported Moving Off South China

CHUNGKING, China, April 7 (AP)—Thirteen Japanese transports and six warships have been sighted off Amoy, on the south coast of China, a military spokesman here declared today.

Three Japanese divisions are concentrated on Japanese Formosa island but their destination has not been ascertained, the spokesman said.

Chinese forces in Burma are engaged with the Japanese striking force to the south of Kyibungan, in the Toungoo region, he added. The Japanese were said to be constructing defenses and not advancing.

KENNEL CLUB HAS BIG DOG, CAT YEAR

More than 1000 dogs and close to 500 cats were handled during the past year by the Klamath Kennel Club and Humane Society, according to a year end report presented to the city council Monday night and signed by Ida M. Odell, secretary and treasurer.

Of the 496 cats which the society cared for, 430 were disposed of and home were found for 66. Homeless dogs totaled 1038, of which it was found necessary to dispose of 638. Homes were found for 384, and 16 remained in the kennels on the last day of the year. The total number of dogs and cats cared for reached a new high of 1534.

In addition the following animals were relieved of pain and suffering, restored to owners, or homes were found for them: a nuisance: rabbits, calves, sheep, chickens, cows, horses, ducks, one coyote, a pelican and some goats.

Mrs. Odell stated in the report, "it would be impossible to enumerate the number of investigations made but since September, 248 cases were investigated, 71 dead animals were picked up during our management within the city limits."

Standlee Arrives At Kuibyshev in American Plane

KUIBYSHEV, Russia, April 7 (AP)—A plane with the red, white and blue insignia of the United States brought the new U. S. ambassador, Admiral William Harrison Standlee, to Kuibyshev today.

The two-ton aircraft was the first American plane to arrive in "war paint" in the soviet union.

Standlee stepped out into the foot-deep slush of the airfield and said: "Well, it's good to be here. We've been on the way 19 days."

many weeks, but declared that the Germans had "adjusted" their lines after heavy bayonet fighting.

A bulletin from Hitler's field headquarters conceded that the Russians were pressing attacks "on several sectors" of the long, thawing front, but asserted that "our own offensive operations brought further successes." No details were given.

British RAF bombers, relentlessly continuing their great spring aerial offensive, struck again into the German Ruhr and Rhineland overnight despite "very bad weather" to blast nazi war factories. The attack followed a cross-channel thrust by more than 300 RAF bombers Sunday night.

"J" Canal Water Flows Tuesday

B. E. Hayden, reclamation bureau superintendent, announced that water was turned into the "J" canal Tuesday for irrigation in the area south and east of Merrill.

Hayden said water probably would be released into the main canal the latter part of the week but that no date had been set.
