

LEGION PLANS STOP FOREST FIRES WEEK

Started years ago by Hal Ogle, forester of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, and charter member of Klamath post No. 8, the American Legion is again this year making elaborate plans for "Stop Forest Fires Week."

This project has grown so that now it covers the entire state of Oregon, and is part of the "Keep Oregon Green" committee. Walter Weisendanger, local, business man and Legionnaire, has been chairman here for several years, and under his leadership it has grown to be one of the major activities of this post. At a meeting held in Salem in March, Mr. Weisendanger was elected state vice chairman for 1942.

Weisendanger said this campaign will start early in the year, and finishes May 7, before the fire season starts, to educate the public to become fire-conscious and prepare for the fire season.

The campaign will wind up this year in Klamath Falls with a huge parade, comprising every type and kind of fire fighting apparatus from all over the county, northern California and the city of Klamath Falls. The forest service, Indian service and CCC camps are well represented. The high school band, twirlers, and Pep Peppers will furnish the music and color.

Governor Charles A. Sprague will be the speaker at a banquet to be held in the Willard hotel that evening. His subject will be "Forest Defense and State Defense."

CANYON CITY, Ore., April 8 (AP)—Eastern Oregon's mountain water storage is better than usual, but stockmen need warm weather at once to improve early range conditions, the regional water forecast committee said Monday.

A report blamed cold weather for delay in grass growth, but said prospects for the spring range in forest grazing areas were reasonably good, particularly in the amount of water available for stock.

The committee said farmers probably will have to irrigate earlier than usual, but that reservoir supplies will be adequate.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8 (AP) No comment on the resignation of William Dalrymple as Oregon regional CIO director was forthcoming from his office here Tuesday.

His office would not comment on whether he would remain here in connection with district No. 50 work.
