## LaGuardia Points Out Difficulty in Civilian Defense

NEW YORK, April 13 (AP)—Mayor F. H. La Guardia contends that "You can't be a good fellow in Washington and a good director of the office of civilian defense at the same time." The mayor resigned as head of the OCD February 10 and his remark was directed "in all friendliness" to "my distinguished successor," James M. Landis. La Guardia, in his regular Sunday "radio talk to the people" asserted that Landis had been lax in providing municipalities with defense supplies and equipment. "None of it has been received," said the mayor. "Now there is no reason for that. I speak freely about it. The appropriations were obtained before I resigned on February 10. Specifications were completed."

## Sulphanilimide to Help Army Fight Wound Infections

PORTLAND, Ore., April 13 (AP)—New achievements will be recorded by army and naval medical services in preventing and curing wound infections, representatives of the two services predicted here today.

The greatest hope is held through the equipping of each soldier with 12 half-grain sulphanilimide tablets, Col. Hugh J. Morgan of the office of the surgeon general of the army, told physicians, surgeons and hospital representatives from Oregon, Washington and Montana at a "war session" under American College of Surgeons auspices. The tablets are to be taken orally by wounded soldiers, and the drug in crystal form also is
