

Albany Has Double Duty in Civilian Defense Program

(Editor's Note: Here is another in the series of civilian defense stories written by prominent Oregon newspapermen.)

ALBANY, Ore., April 13 (AP)—Gateway to vast timber resources to the east and to Camp Henry R. Adair to the west, Albany is trying to do double duty in carrying on its civilian defense program, and its people have been told by national civilian defense authorities that they are doing a pretty good job of it.

Immediately in need of protection are three large wood-working plants whose production is now largely in the interests of the war program and whose raw materials come chiefly from eastern Linn county, plus a score of lesser industries which are processing foodstuffs produced by farmers of the rich Albany agricultural area.

Aware of their responsibilities, the people of Albany have turned out in a big way for civilian defense work. Meanwhile, they are laying the foundation also for projects to enhance the welfare of soldiers at nearby Camp Adair.

For civilian defense tasks, more than 3000 residents of Albany—men, women, and older boys and girls—have enrolled, and nearly all have been assigned to duties varying from sewing to policing. More important departments of the program have absorbed defense workers as follows:

Civil air patrol, headquarters at the Albany municipal airport, engaging 70 men and women, including a score or more of licensed pilots.

Police reserves, encompassing 110 active members, who in their last test turned out 90 strong, each at his post, in 28 minutes.

State guard unit, newly organized, with 65 members.

Air raid wardens, numbering 272, all active.

Fire wardens, 75, and fire watchers, 30, all thoroughly rehearsed.

Air raid warning service, centering at Albany, involving 40 warning board watchers besides administration staff for the entire county.

Red Cross ambulance corps, including 30 panel delivery trucks available for emergency use as ambulances.

Transport corps, now including 30 emergency trucks, still in process of organization.

Necessities division, through which more than 300 local women are learning home nursing, industrial skills and first aid, preparing themselves for all manner of service should emergency arise, and doing service now when asked. These women have made extensive plans for housing, clothing and feeding of potential refugees and evacuees.

Red Cross sewing or production division, which is engaging an average of 30 women a week.

Utilities division, yet in its infancy.

Medical unit, under direction of the Linn County Medical society, also centering at Albany and engaging all local physicians, through whom emergency hospital facilities have been arranged in churches and public buildings.

In addition to this, the Albany public school system, cooperating with the state department of vocational education, is sponsoring defense industries classes including a carpentry class, enrolling nearly 100 men; a class in sheet metal work and prospective classes in other skills; a class in war-time salesmanship, to train help for replacement of clerks and salesmen called into military service, now starting, and still further training courses, designed as are the carpentry and sheet metal working classes, to provide competent men for work on construction of Camp Adair, in shipyards and in kindred occupations.

The former Albany college campus is in use, its extensive buildings housing shop equipment and study groups, and its dormitories filled with young men intent on qualifying for wartime tasks as well as for subsequent peace-time vocations.

Pertaining no less to the war program are preparations under way and already operating here to house and feed workers, now numbering hundreds but expected to total thousands, engaged in the Camp Adair construction projects, and later to entertain and accommodate in various ways the soldiers who will ultimately inhabit the camp.

In this work the Albany chamber of commerce has been given leadership, conducting housing surveys, reviewing recreation facilities and cooperating with city and county officials as well as with the four-county cantonment committee in disposing of problems which are arising daily in connection with this vast project.

So, Albany, perhaps more than the majority of towns in its class, is busy with the work of helping to carry on this war.

COUNTRY AHEAD OF FIRST WAR RECORD

SULPHUR SPRINGS, Tex., April 13 (AP)—Rep. Sam Rayburn, speaker of the house, says the United States now has six times as many soldiers on the battlefronts—after four months—as General Pershing had after 10 months of the war of 1917-1918, and that production of supplies for these troops was running ahead of schedule.

But despite this bright picture, the Texas democrat told a unity rally Friday, he did not expect the end of the war in 1942.

He sketched this outline of arms production:

More than 3300 planes are pouring out of factories monthly, well ahead of schedule, tank production is ahead of schedule with one company alone turning out an entire trainload daily, and anti-aircraft gun production is in advance of schedules.

Production goals in shipping undoubtedly will be met by summer or early fall, and Garand rifles are rolling out of factories by the thousand. Enough of the latter are available to equip every soldier who needs one.

Rayburn blamed isolationists for reverses in the Pacific, recalling that as majority leader three years ago, "I lost the first battle of Guam."

Canadian farms had a total of 5,882,000 hogs at the first of June, 1940, compared with 4,294,000 a year earlier.

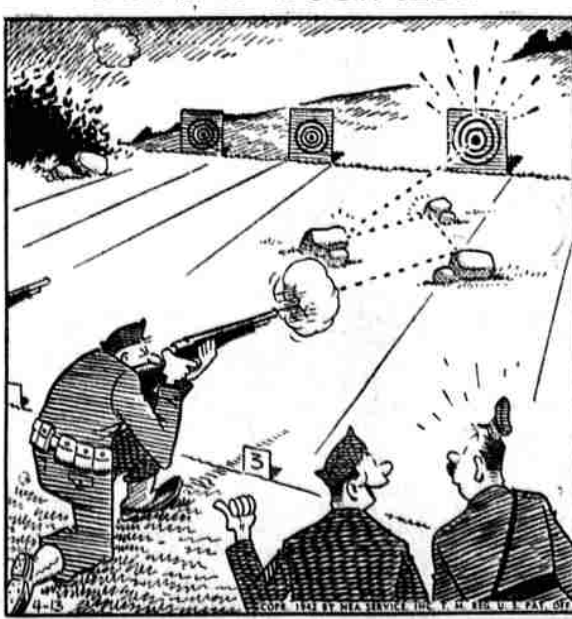
