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vasion columns driving into the earth-scorched Yenangyaung oil fields in western Burma.

A New Delhi communique said the allies completed a fighting withdrawal across the Pinchaung river "but not without losses of personnel and equipment."

The Pinchaung flows into the Irrawaddy river near the town of Yenangyaung, which Chinese reinforcements had captured only a few days ago.

The communique said fighting continued "in and around Yenangyaung," implying that the Japanese had swept back into the town after being driven three miles to the south by counter-attacking Chinese troops.

On the allied left flank, other Japanese columns thrusting toward Mandalay were reported to be throwing tanks and guns into a furious assault against Lieut.-Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's Chinese forces at Pymnana, 60 miles north of Toungoo and about midway between Rangoon and Mandalay.

In the Philippines, a U. S. navy communique reported that two of Lieut. John D. Bulkley's sharp-sting mosquito boats, hiding in secret, jungle-screened bases among the 7000 islands of the Philippine archipelago, boldly attacked a Japanese cruiser protected by four destroyers in a recent night raid on Cebu Island.

The communique said the tiny PT-41's darted in against strong Japanese fire and left the cruiser sinking.

The navy's report somewhat offset an army communique disclosing that nearly 3000 national guardsmen from nine states were among the 37,000 American-Filipino defenders killed, wounded or taken prisoner in the historic battle of Bataan. Only 107 guardsmen were evacuated to Corregidor Island when Bataan fell, April 9.

Interesting Notes of Herald and News Advertisers, Their Products and Activities

A new plan for organizations to send cigarettes to service men has been worked out by Chesterfield, according to G. L. Clark, local Liggett and Myers Tobacco company representative.

Chesterfields may be mailed to any man in the U. S. armed services in Canada or England for 65c a carton. This is net cost, with import duty and U. S. federal cigarette tax eliminated, and with Liggett and Myers standing the cost of mailing.

Under this plan mailings to an individual are restricted to one carton per week in Canada and five cartons in two weeks in England.

Organizations may take advantage of this offer through G. L. Clark here, or by addressing the Export Department, Liggett and Myers Tobacco Co., 630 5th Ave., New York City. The individual's complete rank, name and mailing address should be sent with the remittance, Clark said.

The same plan applies for service men in the United States, Hawaii and Alaska, except that federal cigarette tax applies in this case, making the price per carton \$1.152. For U. S. mailings orders should be sent to Liggett and Myers at 615 Fourth street, San Francisco.

SUGAR RATIONING PLANS COMPLETED

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register at high schools April 28 and 29, as will industrial and institutional users.

Restaurants Cut

The cut in the amount of sugar reserved for restaurants, caterers, hotels and others supplying food services, amounts to 5 per cent of the quantity used in the corresponding month last year, or if records of last year's use are not available, half the amount used in March, 1942, the OPA said.

OPA set forth in detail the regulations concerning registration, many of which have been announced previously. One adult member of each family unit may register for the entire family group, getting a ration book for each member of the family, it was stated. Any family unit not having an adult member should be registered by the oldest member or by a responsible adult authorized to act on behalf of the minors.

Consumers who are not members of a family unit should register for themselves. Persons confined in public or private hospitals, asylums, prisons, or similar institutions are not eligible for registration while so confined.

Special provisions were made for those incapacitated by illness, injury or other reason and unable to register for themselves in the May 4-7 period. These individuals may be registered by the person caring for them or by such other persons as they designate.

Consumers not eligible to receive a ration book at the time of registration, because of ownership of more than six pounds of sugar, will obtain their books by applying to local ration boards after the start of the "latest ration periods during which stamps become valid having a weight value equal to the excess sugar supply owned on May 4, 1942."

Children born after the registration dates will be entitled to normal sugar rations and may be registered at any time by parents or guardians at the local ration board.

Blanket Ceiling On Prices May Be Announced Tuesday

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP) Authoritative sources said today a blanket price order freezing virtually all retail, wholesale and manufacturers' prices at their March levels probably will be announced by Price Administrator Leon Henderson at a press conference next Tuesday.

It was understood the ceiling order, covering all consumer items with the probable exception of foods, would permit each store to use as its maximum the highest price charged for each item last month.

The sweeping abandonment of the existing piecemeal price control technique has been in preparation for weeks by OPA, but action has been deferred, it was said, pending President Roosevelt's presentation to congress of a broad inflation control program.

The White House has disclosed that Mr. Roosevelt would shortly send a message to congress covering all cost-of-living problems, including labor, taxes, prices and profits, and that it would be followed Monday night by a broadcast to the nation by the chief executive.

Meanwhile it was reported that retail officials had attempted to induce the office of price administration to set wholesale prices back to December, instead of March, levels in the proposed overall price action.

BLOOD TYPING TO START THURSDAY

An intensive program which will involve all men, women and children in Klamath county, will be inaugurated Thursday when the junior chamber of commerce opens its blood typing campaign.

Estle Affleck is chairman of the blood typing program and assisted by Dr. George H. Merzmann Jr., and Ramon Kent. Forty-five other members of the junior chamber are also working on the program which they hope will reach 40,000 persons within a period of two years time.

First work will be under way Thursday-morning when senior students at Klamath Union high school will submit blood for typing. Junior chamber members are carrying out this program at the request of the national defense council and are being aided by Dr. Peter H. Rozendal and all others of the Klamath county health department. The typing will be done through the department's laboratory.

Individuals will be contacted by the committee as the work continues, Affleck stated. Further information will be given through the newspapers.
