

SEVEN ELECTED DIRECTORS FOR CHAMBER HERE

Seven new directors for the Klamath county chamber of commerce were announced at Wednesday's board meeting, following the annual election. They are Elmer Balsiger, George P. Davis, Malcolm Epley, L. E. Jacobs, J. W. Kerns, Percy Murray and Verne Owens.

Four of these men have never before served on the chamber board. They are Davis, Epley, Jacobs and Owens.

Holdover members of the board, who will serve with the seven elected this week, are Fred Heilbrunner, Don Drury, Godfrey Blohm, A. M. Collier, William Ganong, Henry Semon and Mitchell Tillotson.

Officers of the chamber will be elected by the newly constituted board next Wednesday.

At Wednesday's meeting, Don Drury, chairman of the industrial development committee, said that a survey had shown the mills here would generally provide work for 48 hours a week if the 40-hour week law were changed.

He also reported on the committee's work in connection with wood utilization and promotion of a study of the use of jackpine as a raw material for wood pulp.

Drury said his committee recommends that the state of Oregon change its law to permit factory work by persons from 16 years and up, conforming to a federal statute. The state law now sets the minimum age at 18.

Efforts of the chamber to obtain a lifting of rationing restrictions on gasoline in this area were reported and discussed at some length. All but two of the local gas companies are getting their gasoline by tank truck or trailer directly from California, and should not be affected by the tanker situation in the northwest, it was stated.

This enterprise will be continued by the chamber.

It was pointed out that the fuel oil problem is similar to that in gasoline, and a hardship may be worked on oil users here without justification unless the set-up is changed.

The pending bill proposed an allotment of \$20 for a wife; \$30 for a wife and one child, with \$10 monthly for each additional child; \$15 for a child if no wife, with \$10 for each additional child; \$20 monthly to a former wife, divorced but awarded alimony. These would be Class A dependents.

For Class B dependents, the bill would provide \$15 for one parent, \$25 for two parents, and \$5 for each grandchild, brother or sister.

supplies of tanks and guns are arriving from overseas in increasing numbers and quantities of vital war equipment have been received from ships originally destined for the Dutch East Indies.

Curtin gave a cordial welcome to United States forces which recently have landed in New Caledonia and declared that "MacArthur's directive provides that the combined resources of our allies and ourselves will be devoted to the protection of the military regions of Australia as bases for future offensive action against Japan."

By the occupation of bases in the Solomon Islands, he declared, the Japanese indicated that they were "reaching toward our sea-borne communications with America."

NELLIE HOWARD, 87, DIES HERE TUESDAY

Ellen M. (Nellie) Howard, 87, who crossed the plains to California in the spring of 1863, died shortly before midnight Tuesday at her home on Summers lane where she had lived for the past 23 years. Her passing is mourned by her three sons as well as scores of old friends and neighbors to whom she was affectionately known as "Grandma" Howard.

Mrs. Howard was born Ellen M. Cooley, daughter of "Squire" and Elmira Cooley, in McHenry county, Illinois, on October 19, 1854. With her parents she crossed the plains in a covered wagon and children of the neighborhood have congregated in her home for years to listen to the stories of that memorable trip and to the tales of early gold rush days in California.

The Cooley family settled in Fort Jones, Calif., near Yreka, and "Major" Cooley lived there for many years where he followed the trade of blacksmith. On July 4, 1875, Ellen Cooley was married to Henry Clay Howard, the service performed in Alturas where they lived for a number of years. Mr. Howard died some 25 years ago. He was a prominent stockman of that area. In 1919, Mrs. Howard moved to Klamath Falls to be near her three sons, Mark Twain and Henry Clay of this city and Royal Raymond Howard of Crystal.

Mrs. Howard was a member of the Klamath temple and was active in church work up until a short time before her death. She had been ill for some time, her passing hastened by her years.

In addition to her three sons, Mrs. Howard is survived by six grandchildren, Mrs. F. Ray Fekker of Seattle who was called here by the illness of her grandmother, Bert E. Miller, Robert, James Edward and Raymond Howard and Hazel Stewart, all of Klamath Falls; three great-grandchildren, Dorothy Harnish of Yakima, Wash., Patsy Ruth Miller and Marilyn Howard of this city, and one great-great-grandchild, Michael Harnish of Yakima.

Final rites will be held Thursday at 2 p. m. in the Earl Whitlock funeral home chapel with burial in the Linkville cemetery.

WATCH Norway. It's a hot spot.

British bombers are industriously pounding Trondheim, in whose harbor there is a heavy concentration of German warships—gathered there presumably for an attack in force on the main British-American supply line to Russia.

For days the Royal Air Force has been smashing at Rostock, coming back night after night. Your map will point out that Rostock is a convenient German port from which to send fighting forces to Norway, as well as to the Russian front.

NOTE also the METHOD in the British bombing.

The RAF is pounding steadily away at war industry plants, air-dromes, docks—seeking by destruction of such vital military facilities to make it impossible for the Germans to wage EFFECTIVE war.

Little time is being wasted in efforts to frighten civilians. German civilians will be most effectively frightened by destruction of the German war machine.

PRESIDENT SPEAKS ON WAR SACRIFICE

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Japanese have made since they started their frenzied career of conquest, they have had to pay a very heavy toll in warships, in transports, in planes and in men. They are feeling the effects of these losses.

In Europe, the great Russian offensive is "destroying more armed power of our enemies—troops, planes, tanks and guns—than all the other united nations put together."

Defeatism is slowly spreading in the axis countries. The Germans and Italians have "a growing conviction that the cause of nazism and fascism is hopeless."

On the home front, the president said that "every single person in the United States is going to be affected" by his seven-point national economic policy of heavier taxes, price ceilings, stabilized wages, rationing of essential commodities, and widespread investment in war bonds. He warned businessmen that their profits would be cut, their incomes slashed by punishing taxes. He notified labor that it would have to forego higher wages. He told farmers that price ceilings were being placed on their products.

der will be aimed at such "cost of living" items as tobacco, meat, canned goods, clothing, and packaged household drugs, and Henderson estimated that housewives would find 60 to 75 per cent of all foods back at March costs when the universal ceiling takes effect in retail stores May 18.

Retailers will be required after that date to post public lists of the ceiling prices on "cost of living" items.

Wholesalers and manufacturers prices will be affected May 11. Beginning July 1, rates charged for "retail services"—such as garages, tailors, laundries, dry cleaners, and shoe repair shops—likewise must revert to the March base.

Loud protests against pegging both wholesale and retail prices to the same month were voiced by store owners who said they had not kept pace with increasing wholesale prices during March.

One Fifth Avenue, New York department store executive, describing Henderson's order as "completely unfair" to the retailer, said stores that kept their prices to the public down while selling inventories purchased at earlier lower levels "were now being penalized."
