

VICHY LISTS 40 KILLED IN NIGHT ATTACK

at the docks of Ostend, airplanes in the low countries, and mine-laying in enemy waters.

Shortly after dawn allied aircraft swept over the channel again to strafe shipping and air-dromes.

Daylight Raids

It was learned authoritatively that fighters and hurricane bombers struck at shipping off Brittany and destroyed two German fighters during the morning, then later swept over the Calais area and escorted Boston bombers in an attack on the Le Havre docks.

(The Germans acknowledged that considerable damage was done to buildings at Gennevilliers, 10 miles from the heart of Paris, and said the RAF also raided the north German coast.)

Reuters, British news agency, said the Vichy radio reported 52 persons killed and about 100 injured in Gennevilliers. It was the fifth raid in less than two months of factories in the Paris area.

Norwich Raided

While RAF bombers were engaged over the continent, the Nazi air force lashed back with a short but sharp overnight assault on Norwich, in East Anglia, which a communiqué said had caused casualties and damage—mostly in residential and shopping areas.

The Berlin radio said the raid on Norwich, which also was bombed Monday night, was a severe reprisal for attacks upon German towns.

The Germans said none of their planes was shot down, but declared two British raiders were destroyed over German-occupied territory.

London, meanwhile, was stirred by reports from Stockholm which quoted Berlin sources as saying that United States fighter planes now were participating in the defense of Malta, Britain's vital Mediterranean island area.

The Berlin sources did not specify how the American planes had reached Malta, but suggested they might have come from an aircraft carrier.

(President Roosevelt said Tuesday night in a radio address that American warships were now in the Mediterranean.)

Indian Service to Build Sprague Road On Force Account

The Indian service will build its section of the Sprague River road project on force account, Agency Superintendent B. G. Courtwright said Thursday. Courtwright conferred at the agency with Indian Service Highway Supervisor H. J. Doolittle, who was here from Spokane.

Efforts are being made, Courtwright said, to get priority assistance for the state highway commission in order that it may proceed with its share of the road.

Federal and state governments are each committed to spend \$150,000 on the road. The federal or Indian service job extends from Sprague River to Chiloquin, and the state job from the Lakeview highway to Sprague River.

The Indian service will start its project Monday.

BATTLE STILL RAGES AROUND LASHIO FLANK

headquarters reported that allied airmen destroyed or damaged 20 Japanese planes and started big fires in an attack on the Japanese air base at Lashio, New Guinea, and also battered anew at the enemy base at Koe-pang, on Dutch Timor island.

"Flying Tigers" of the American volunteer group fighting in Burma were credited with a spectacular victory over the Japanese air force, shooting down 22 of 24 planes which attempted to raid Loiwing on the Burma-Yunnan border.

The AVG fliers emerged without loss of a single plane. On the Pacific front, latest dispatches said allied troops fighting to hold bomb-wrecked Mandalay were sharply threatened with envelopment.

Reporting on the situation in the Philippines, allied headquarters said the Japanese had landed reinforcements from five transports at Parang on the west shore of Mindanao island, apparently in a determined effort to crush the small American and Filipino forces which still are maintaining gallant resistance there.

(The Tokyo radio reported today that Japanese forces had completed occupation of both Parang and Cotabato, a short distance south. The retreating defenders left both towns afire, the Japanese declared.)

Corregidor fortress, the communiqué said, again underwent heavy bombing yesterday and the surrounding fortified islands were extensively shelled. The guns of the forts answered the Japanese fire, silencing three batteries and destroying a truck column on the Luzon shore, headquarters said.

REDS CLAIM MAJOR VICTORY ON FRONT

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a half dozen German-garrisoned points between Lake Ilmen and the Sea of Azov, probably Kursk, Orel or Kharkov, on the southern front which have long been objectives of Russian drives).

The high command said the Russians had been using strong tank forces in fighting around Orel, concentrating their attacks for several days in an area northeast of that railroad town which is 200 miles below Moscow.

All the red army thrusts were beaten off with Russian losses in tanks and infantrymen, said high command report, which was broadcast following issuance of the routine communiqué.

AIR TRAINING IN FULL SWING HERE

Training of University of Oregon students under the civilian pilot training program is now in full swing at the Klamath Falls airport, with eight planes in use and eight instructors handling the work through the Oregon Aircraft Service.

About two-thirds of the 60 students from the university are already here, and others will arrive in a few days. The primary classes have started, and secondary work will begin when the others arrive. The whole program moved to the municipal field here from Eugene when flying restrictions were placed on the Eugene area because of the war emergency.

The trainees are staying at private homes in this community, and the chamber of commerce announced Wednesday that most of these young men would like to have part-time or full-time work while in Klamath Falls. The students will have to stagger working hours in order to get in their training work.

Chamber of commerce directors expressed the opinion that in view of employment conditions here, the students could probably find work with little difficulty. Anyone interested in giving work to the trainees should call the chamber of commerce.

The Oregon Aircraft Service, which is headed by Louis Soukup, has built a shop and rebuilt the office at the airport in connection with the firm's operations here. The firm is carrying on the training program under contract with the government.

\$108.42, provided they work the full 84 hours. All construction workers are paid straight time for 40 hours work and time and one-half for overtime.

Ordinary labor, at 87 1/2 cents, will pay \$92.75 per week. Other scales range between the two. Carpenters earn \$1.30 per hour, pipe layers and concrete men, 95 cents; journeyman electricians, \$1.50; heavy equipment operators, \$1.75; others \$1.10; cement finishers \$1.35. Kitchen employees are paid \$105 per month for 40 hours work each week and time and one-half for all overtime at a pro-rated scale.

Live at Camp

Willis said that thus far approximately 600 men have left the Tule lake job, most of them because of the heavy daily pressure of 11 hours of steady work. Over 500 workers have been imported by the contractors to fill a desperate need for men. Nearly 100 of those who quit, he said, were brought here from southern California but found weather conditions too severe.

All employees on the giant project are living at the camp site and buying their meals at the camp kitchen for \$12.25 per week.

Willis discounted rumors of union-ordered slowdowns as anti-union propaganda. All work is being done, he said, and is to be put in a full day's work.

Installation Plan

The BTC official said that all employees must belong to an AFL organization to hold a job. The majority of the men are under the jurisdiction of the Shasta county Building and Trades council but teamsters and culinary workers come within the realm of the Klamath locals.

Initiation fees and dues, Willis asserted, may be paid on an installment plan. Fees and dues vary with job classifications. Meanwhile indications were that many Portland Japanese would be shunted to the Tule lake camp upon its completion. All Nippons in the rose city have been ordered to report and be ready for transference within the next week.

Selectees Warned Not to Be Hasty In Property Disposal

CAMP MURRAY, Wash., April 30 (AP)—Selective service registrants should not make final disposition of financial and personal affairs just because they have passed the physical examination of the local draft board, Adjutant General Walter J. DeLong warned Wednesday.

"Every selectee must undergo final physical examination at the army reception center," DeLong said. "The examination by the local board is purely preliminary. No selectee should presume that because he passed the local board tests, or even because he has been ordered to an army reception center, that he will be accepted."

General DeLong explained that many registrants have disposed of property and positions of employment after passing the board examination, only to find the army physicians did not accept them.

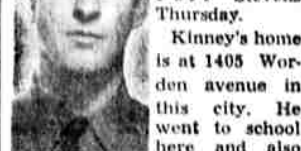
All selectees, he said, may ask for 10-day furloughs a few days after they don their uniforms to return home and put their affairs in order.

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DRAFT DEFERMENT HIT BY PAY PLAN

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP) Senator Johnson (D-Colo.) suggested today that "dependency as a cause of deferment" from military service might be eliminated by congressional approval of a measure now before the senate military committee.

Men with wives, children, parents or others to support would be able to join the fighting forces if the government assured them that their dependents would be provided for, the western senator explained.

Johnson said, however, that as chairman of the subcommittee in charge of the bill he would press for some sort of estimate on the cost to the government before trying to bring the measure up in the senate.

"I want some facts on costs before I'll ever dare show up in the senate," Johnson told reporters. "I also think congress is entitled to know how many people this will effect."

Under the pending measure, wives and children of men in the armed services would be given a preferred status as Class A dependents, with \$20 deducted monthly for their support from the pay of men in lower grades. To this the government would add \$20 for the wife, making a total of \$40 monthly, and \$10 additional for each child. Thus a wife with three children would receive \$70 a month, of which \$20 would come from her husband's pay and the rest from the government.

homes and stock barns formerly stood.

One of the victims, Mrs. Dale Paddock, was found on a creek bank, her head and shoulders driven into the ground by the twister. Her 4-year-old son was blown into the creek and his body was not found until daylight. Her husband, the third member of the family was killed also.

Gus Leipner, his wife and daughter, were killed in the wreckage of their home.

Oberlin is in the northwest corner of Kansas, about 30 miles south of the Nebraska line.

Ambulances from Norton, Kas., 28 miles east of the stricken area had moved nine injured to McCook, Neb., hospitals. Sixteen others were reported taken to the hospital in Oberlin.

C. J. Jacoby, Norton newspaper man, said a returning ambulance driver told him it appeared only a half dozen farm houses were hit by the freak twister which dipped into a valley about a mile east of Oberlin. The dead were taken from two homes which were demolished—those of Paddock and Leipner, he said.

EADS, Colo., April 30 (AP)—Four persons were killed today by a tornado which swept through the Pine Flats farming area near this eastern Colorado community.

Mrs. Clara Koch of the Kiowa county sheriff's office said the dead were Mrs. Charles Davis, 36; Mrs. Max Mays, 23; a filling station operator named Gilbert and Sam Castleman, about 60. The tornado struck about 3:30 a. m. (MWT) from south, Mrs. Koch said, and carried the Davis and Mays farmhouses more than a mile.

The Pine Flats school house was also demolished, she said. Pine Flats is about 5 miles southeast of Eads.

Mrs. Koch said the tornado appeared to come from the direction of McClave, south of here, and said that she heard two persons were killed at McClave but was unable to confirm the report.
