France on the Road Back to War?



This is France in the spring of '42, a nation divided not only by the Nazi occupation line, but also by her people's views on collaboration with the Nazis. The new Vichy government may swing the nation back into war in following its pro-Nazi policies, while anti-Nazi Frenchmen are primed with propaganda to accept war against their former allies. Meanwhile, British bombs fall on the German bases and Nazi-controlled industries of occupied France, anti-German incidents continue there, and ominous military and naval activity is reported in Vichy's half.

Navy Cautions Against 'Officially Approved' Products

There have been occasions wherein salesmen have strongly inferred that their product, whether it be patriotic posters, special flags, or advertising, has the official approval of the United States navy or of the public relations office of the thirteenth naval district.

The navy does not attempt to give ratings to products or publications and does not desire to retard any legitimate enterprise, but it does object vigorously to inferences of navy approval, especially in the solicitation of subscriptions and advertising. No legitimate publication makes such inferences, and therefore, none will be harmed by such a warning to the general public.

Donaldson Calls For Reduction In Wheat Crop

CORVALLIS, May 1 (AP)—Wheat production must be reduced this year, N. C. Donaldson, state AAA executive, said Thursday, and even then Oregon farmers may have to pile half of the 1942 crop on the ground unless more storage space is provided.

An erroneous news report recently interpreted Agriculture Secretary Wickard as indicating that unlimited wheat production was wanted. This has caused confusion on the eve of the second referendum vote on wheat quotas, Donaldson said. The report was not carried by the Associated Press.

PENDLETON, Ore., May 1 (AP)—Setting an example to serve as a warning to future offenders, Circuit Court Judge C. L. Sweek Thursday morning sentenced Teddy E. Ehrhart, 35, to five years in state prison after the prisoner pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny of tires.

In passing sentence, Judge Sweek explained that the crime of stealing tires had become extremely serious due to the rubber shortage, and promised similar heavy penalties for like offenses.

The prisoner admitted stealing two wheels, tires and tubes on April Fool's day from a car on the Umatilla Indian reservation—but isn't regarding the theft as a prank anymore.

Malin Grade School Girls Aid Red Cross in Bake Sale

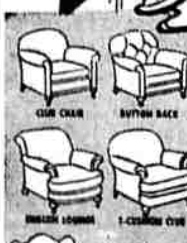
