

LAVAL SAYS BREAK DEPENDS ON U. S.

announced that British paratroopers, followed by light armored forces, landed on Madagascar this morning.

Marion disclosed that Marshal Petain, chief of state, had sent this message to Madagascar's Governor Armand Annet:

"I have today learned of British aggression against Madagascar. To the ultimatum asking for surrender, the military governor replied, 'we will defend ourselves to the end.'"

"This is the only reply he could make and he made it."

"Tell him that I am at his side in this tragic trial in which he is defending the honor of France. To the civil population, unjustly attacked, and to soldiers, sailors and airmen and their chiefs, I send my greetings and those of France."

Jules Brevie, secretary of state for colonies in the Laval government, declared tonight that the Vichy forces on Madagascar were resolved to defend the island against the British occupation expedition and saluted the "valiant troops guarding the honor of the flag" there.

Meanwhile, Japanese Admirals Naokuni and Abe, who have been conferring here with the Japanese ambassador to Vichy, left by plane for Berlin. Their four-day stay here was described as a "courtesy call." They were accompanied as far as Lyon by the naval attaché of their Vichy embassy.

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ed for repair or maintenance work, hospital equipment, etc., but the over-all effect was to ban the manufacture of such common products as bath tubs, cash registers, cigarette lighters, mail boxes, fountain pens, pie plates, waste baskets, tea pots, swivel chairs, slide fasteners, voting machines, and all novelties and souvenirs and Christmas tree ornaments.

When present stocks are exhausted the handyman around the house will have to fashion his own fixtures—saws, hammers and screw drivers were excepted from the list.

The decree was the avalanche that followed preliminary orders against the manufacture of automobiles, refrigerators, vacuum cleaners, typewriters and other selected articles.

Limited production will be permitted for 90 days, but after that no metal may be used "except gold or silver."

CHAMBERS ARRIVES FOR CAMP DUTIES

Walter P. Chambers, acting assistant project director for the war relocation authority, has arrived and taken over his duties at the site of the Japanese resettlement camp near Tululake.

The war relocation authority will have charge of the operation of the settlement when it is occupied by Japanese evacuees from coast defense areas. Elmer Sherrill, the project manager, is now in San Francisco, but is expected back in a few days.

Chambers, who is making his home at the Marvin Thomas residence on the Canby highway, warmly praised the community attitude he has discovered in the Klamath basin. "I have had the finest cooperation from everybody," he said.

The war relocation official said the camp construction program is progressing rapidly, and that an ideal set-up for a resettlement program is in the making.

ROOSEVELT LAUDS PTA ACHIEVEMENTS

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., May 5 (P)—President Roosevelt, terming the schools "the bedrock of democracy," gave impetus Monday to the wartime program of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

In a telegraphed message to the annual convention, the president said the congress' past achievements "point the way to still greater achievements."

The urgency of the war effort must not be used as an excuse to lower existing standards for child labor, the congress was told by its president.

Mrs. William Kietzer of Portland, Ore., in her convention report declared "the large increase in the number of labor permits that have been issued to minors should give us pause."

"In many states this increase has been over 300 per cent. Great pressure for the use of child labor is coming from industrial agriculture. This is not to be confused with work on family farms."

"In the name of patriotism it may be necessary for all of us to help harvest crops."

"We must distinguish between such emergencies and exploitation of children because their labor can be secured cheaply."

U. S. May Assail State Barriers

WASHINGTON, May 5 (P)—Federal intervention to break state and local transportation bottlenecks may be undertaken, Joseph B. Eastman, director of defense transportation, today told a conference of state representatives.

Earlier Donald M. Nelson, chairman of the war production board, had demanded that non-essential transportation-hindering laws and regulations be removed.

Eastman said the numerous limitations on both railroads and trucks, such as the lengths of trains or the weight of trucks, were impeding the war effort.
