

SCRAP METAL COLLECTIONS SOARING HERE

Mountains of scrap iron and metal have been collected throughout the county since January 1, according to a report sent to County Judge U. E. Reeder, chairman of the county defense council, by Bob McCambridge, assistant agricultural agent and county scrap metal chairman.

Scrap gathered from January 1 to March 31 includes 514.75 tons of cast iron and steel and 50 tons of paper. During the month of April 472.59 tons of metal have been gathered up, making a total to May 1 of 1087.34 tons of scrap. During April alone 25.20 tons of rubber, 6.1 tons of rags and 25 tons of paper were collected, Judge Reeder stated. The work will continue throughout the year.

The metal has been sold to local dealers, money derived from the sale used for defense or worthwhile purposes by the individual communities.

All put together, they constitute quite a problem for Hitler.

INSTALLMENT SALES CURBED

WASHINGTON, May 6 (UP) The federal reserve board last night ruled that installment purchases must be liquidated in 12 months and placed stringent limitations on charge accounts as part of President Roosevelt's sweeping anti-inflation drive.

The order, effective Wednesday, also requires that loans of \$1500 or less which are to be met in one payment, have a maximum maturity period of not more than 90 days.

Down payments which hitherto were not required on some installment purchases are mandatory on all products in the future.

Down payments were allowed to range from one-fifth to one-third of the purchase price.

Under the new order down payment requirement on all products listed is increased to 33 1/3 per cent of the purchase price.

Charge accounts—one of the most popular means of financing consumers' purchases—come under the board's regulations for the first time. Henceforth, these accounts must be paid by the 10th day of the second calendar month after the purchase is made. (This would range from 40 to 70 days, depending on when the purchase was made.)

NEW RED TROOPS TRIED AT FRONT

LONDON, May 6 (AP)—Industrial plants in Stuttgart again were bombed by the RAF for the second night in succession last night and British raiders also attacked other targets in southern Germany, the British reported today.

The raids were the third in a row against Germany since the start of a new series of aerial assaults Sunday on Adolf Hitler's war and industrial machines.

day, there were 13 separate air attacks on Corregidor on May 5, Wainwright reported, but the shelling by Japanese 240 millimeter siege guns was more disastrous than the aerial bombardment. The final artillery barrage destroyed barbed wire entanglements and blasted machine gun installations and other centers of resistance. Wainwright said, and the Japanese brought their assault troops across the narrow stretch of water from Bataan peninsula in a large number of steel barges.

Corregidor's guns replied to the enemy artillery fire and shelled truck columns in Bataan during the last day, Wainwright reported, but the counter-battery fire was severely handicapped, as it had been throughout the siege of the Manila bay forts, by lack of aerial observations.

Wainwright also reported that the Japanese had landed reinforcements in the vicinity of Malagang near Cotabato on the island of Mindanao, and were moving a considerable force in steel barges up the Pulangi river in Mindanao.

Near Digos, on Davao Gulf in Mindanao, where American-Filipino forces have dealt severe blows at enemy installations in sudden raids, the Japanese are now bringing heavy pressure against Wainwright's troops, the communiqué said.

The doughy American-Filipino troops, who held the island fortress after the loss of Bataan despite sustained air bombardment and a shattering cross fire of heavy shore batteries from both sides of Manila bay, finally were forced to yield to an overwhelming Japanese landing attack.

Surrender of the battered rock was announced in a laconic communiqué from the war department which said that terms were being arranged.

"... Resistance of our troops has been overcome," said the announcement, issued at 4:15 a. m., eastern war time.

"Fighting has ceased and terms are being arranged covering the capitulation of the island forts in Manila bay."

In addition to Fort Mills on Corregidor, a determined, last-ditch fight to prevent the Japanese from making use of Manila bay had been waged from American forts on three smaller islands—Forts Drum, Hughes and Frank.

It was assumed from the communiqué that colors finally had been struck on all four islands.

The victory which the Japanese won at great cost gave them control of the best harbor in the orient and strengthened the long communications lines they have thrust toward Australia and India.

BRITISH MEET FIERCE BATTLE AT NAVY BASE

fighting between the British and French forces was growing fiercer and that waves of British planes were bombing light French naval forces in the harbor of Diego Suarez. Seven British planes were shot down yesterday, the radio said.

The British, striking quickly to prevent Madagascar falling into Japanese hands as a threat to allied shipping in the Indian ocean, advanced about 20 miles from the shore opposite Diego Suarez, and the French acknowledged loss of two of their three warships in a vain attack on British transports laden with men and tanks.

The French ships, sunk by British naval gunfire, were the 1379-ton submarine Beveziers and the 7110-ton auxiliary cruiser Bougainville.

While the French said they were "resisting along the first line of redoubts," they conceded that they were being bombarded from the air and that Madagascar's entire and inconsequential air force was striving almost hopelessly to stave off the assault.

British planes dominated the skies over Diego Suarez and British warships appeared to hold firm control of the surrounding seas, a British military commentator said, so that the way was paved for the British ground forces to seize the port's fortifications one by one from the rear.

Safeguards
"I have read carefully the communication prepared by the Klamath county chamber of commerce and am confident that the safeguards which they ask in the event of a project's location on that site are being fully provided. be noted that a representative of the forest service was on the original committee that recommended the project."

"The experience of the Japanese who came to Merrill, Ore., was one of a series of misunderstandings proved during the period of voluntary evacuation. As a result of similar experience in a number of communities, General DeWitt issued an order prohibiting any further voluntary evacuation after March 29. You may be assured that a repetition of this type incident will be avoided by affording adequate protection to those Japanese destined for the Tule lake project.

"There is every reason to believe that the Klamath basin will benefit by the presence of the Japanese at Tule lake during the war period. A great deal of the development work, such as leveling of land and construction of irrigation works, will have permanent value. According to present plans, the project site contains 30,000 acres suitable for cultivation of which only 15,000 are now served by irrigation structures. In addition, if military and other considerations allow, there is a possibility that certain of the Japanese may be made available to perform properly safeguarded agricultural labor on established farms in the vicinity of the project. It is our understanding that there is a demand for farm laborers, especially in the summer months.

"The Klamath chamber of commerce may be assured as to these points regarding the safety about which they expressed concern:

1. In selecting the site the army considered military safety.
2. Adequate military protection will be afforded at all times.
3. There is no attempt to disturb the unity of the region."
