SEATTLE, May 13 (AP)—Sven Hagerstrom discovered it's hard to give a lion away, but he succeeded on the second try.

Oregon Banks Have Total Resources Of Half Billion

SALEM, May 13 (AP)—All state and national banks in Oregon had total resources of \$505,358,169 on December 1, 1941, a gain of \$90,063,747 from the previous year and an increase of almost \$200,000,000 during the preceding four years, State Superintendent of Banks A. A. Rogers said today in his annual report.

Banks in the city of Portland, including their branches outside the city, had resources of \$430,205,635.

The 47 state and 27 national banks reported \$148,126,973 in loans and discounts, \$245,990,274 in demand deposits, and \$140,174,715 in time deposits.

The deposit figures were the largest in history.

The 47 banks under the jurisdiction of the state banking department was the same number as during 1940, but 48 less than in 1932.

Membership in credit unions increased during the year from 9636 to 10,726, these members borrowing a total of \$1,316,575 during the year.
