Marquez, Redwood City boxer, died from a skull fracture. He did not regain consciousness after he was knocked out in the eighth and last round of a fight at National hall.

Globe will be given a hearing on the manslaughter charge in municipal court Monday.

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the Crimea and along the Sea of Azov.

On the Russian front, heavy rains drenched the Kharkov battlefield as the red armies smashed ever closer to Kharkov against stiffening German resistance.

Toll Claimed

Soviet dispatches said the Germans were paying a terrific toll in killed and wounded.

Hitler's command issued a special communique asserting that Nazi troops penetrated Kerch yesterday "after overcoming stubborn resistance," and added:

"The town and harbor are in German hands."

In any event, the fall of Kerch would not necessarily mean that Hitler could reach out and seize the great Caucasus oil fields, across the narrow Kerch strait from Kerch city.

The Germans held Kerch for two months last year without risking a thrust across Kerch strait under the guns of the Soviet Black Sea fleet.

Soviet dispatches gave no indication of Kerch's fall, reporting merely that stubborn battles raged throughout the night on Kerch peninsula.

Heavy fighting also raged on the Leningrad front, where the Russians reported they annihilated 1200 Germans in a three-day battle in one sector and killed 2000 in another.

Churchill declared that from now on the war would not be "brave men against men armed" but the fight of "people not only with resolve and a cause but who also have weapons."

TEXAS DEFIES ICKES ON GAS OUTPUT RATE

AUSTIN, Tex., May 16 (UP)—The nation's largest oil producing state Friday night defied Federal Petroleum Coordinator Harold Ickes when the Texas railroad commission, oil regulatory body, hiked the allowable oil production for the remainder of May by 240,000 barrels daily.

Ickes had asked that, because of the transportation shortage, Texas' oil production be held to 960,000 barrels daily, but instead the commission raised it to 1,402,038 barrels daily.

Thus Texas, which never before has refused to comply with federal recommendations regarding its vast oil industry, tossed back into Ickes' lap his threats to ask the war production board to force the commission to acquiesce.

Before issuing Friday's order, Commissioners Jerry Sadler and Olin Culberson sent a precautionary telegram to WPB Administrator Donald Nelson asking "to present the position of the Texas railroad commission in this vital war problem" if Ickes formally requested a ruling from Nelson's office.

Sadler has contended that Ickes was being misinformed "about the real situation in Texas" by "certain of his advisers" and recently Sadler accused major oil companies of favoring further production cuts in an attempt to "squeeze the little man out of business."

Voters Okay One-Mill Levy For Fire Need

Klamath Falls voters approved the one-mill levy for four years for replacement of fire department equipment in yesterday's city special election held in connection with the primaries. The vote was, Yes, 1662; No, 953. Figures given are from complete returns.

Defeated was the four-mill continuous levy, an alternative measure, in behalf of the fire department. The vote was, Yes, 1079; No, 1496.

The voters gave their approval

to the charter amendment which transfers the four-tenths of a mill city bond levy from the bond to the police department purposes. This action was recommended by the county grand jury at its last session with the understanding that the money would be used in part for improvement of the city jail and increasing the man power of the police department. The vote: Yes, 1559; No, 1096.

According to city police, Edmond was playing with Richie and Robert Dittmanson, 1800 Le Roy street, about 5 o'clock Friday evening. Henry A. Dittmanson, father of the boys, drove his sedan along the driveway and the three jumped on the running board. Richie and Robert jumped off but young Mahan clung to the machine.

Dittmanson, a Great Northern employe, told police he thought the boy was going to ride to the corner of Fremont and Eldorado and he started to slow down while the car was in low gear. Before he stopped, Dittmanson said, Edmond jumped from the running board and fell to the pavement. At first it was thought the boy was frightened and he was moved to the residence of Iona Sundeth, 1041 Eldorado. Later the woman took Edmond home. His parents called a physician and he was rushed to the hospital where he was admitted at 5:40 p. m.
