HOWARD TALK HIGHLIGHT OF KUHS EXERCISE

"A pre-determined destination worthy of your finest efforts" was the goal which Dr. Charles A. Howard, president of Oregon College of Education urged members of the graduating class of Klamath Union high school to set for themselves in his commencement address before hundreds of parents and townspeople last night.

Dr. Howard, a former Klamath county high school instructor, chose as his topic, "Five Boys and a Man." From real life he drew a picture of the lives, failures and successes of these six typical examples and by such examples proved that determination and education were the two steps toward achievement.

Love Awarded
Before embarking on his commencement address, Dr. Howard reviewed many early experiences during the years he was an instructor in the old Klamath county high school, 1907 to 1911. From that time Dr. Howard has maintained an important place in the Oregon educational system, serving for 10 years as superintendent of public instruction.

Following the salutatory and valedictory addresses, scholarships and awards were made. To Eugene Love went the lion's share of honors. Not only did Love serve as valedictorian of his class, but he received the coveted faculty award for boys, the Kiwanis cup to the outstanding athlete, the Kiwanis gold football award given to senior letter men, the physical science and mathematics awards, but also one of the three Shrine club awards of a \$25 defense bond.

Gold Footballs
The \$50 American Association of University Women award went to Helen Radcliffe who also was one of four receiving perfect attendance awards. The Daughters of the American Revolution award for the outstanding girl home maker went to E. Della Shipman. The AAUW award was presented by Mrs. Dean Miller, the DAR award by Mrs. Robert Odell.

massed soviet forces were smashing violently at many places below Belgorod, 30 miles north of Kharkov.

Bucharest reports said powerful axis blows had forced the Russians to withdraw Tuesday to the environs of Chuguev, 20 miles southeast of Kharkov, and a bitter fight is now in progress there.

Other Bucharest dispatches, countering the German high command's claim that the battle of Kerch was "concluded," admitted that soviet troops were "still fighting with sharp resistance at many points" in the eastern Crimea.

ball shaped smoke. A shell explodes, leaves this puff of smoke. Then the Japs started to take up. After the first 30 minutes the bombs did little damage. It was the first 15 minutes that left our harbor and ships a shambles.

Shrapnel Falls
"As I said, we were just standing around like a bunch of geese. Well, when the shrapnel began to pour down on us we took to cover. There were about 50 of us standing there and none were hurt, but on the hill in back about 500 had gathered to watch the bombing and there were four pretty badly hurt by the shrapnel.

"All the time you didn't have time to get a scared feeling, but gosh were you mad! And later I found out that almost all civilians and soldiers felt alike. They weren't so scared but boy, were they mad.

Could See Ships
"The bombing continued until about 11:30 in the morning. Then it was quiet. We sent 20 trucks from our project to haul out the dead and injured and for several days had trucks on the job to rehabilitate the area. The dead were buried in the navy grounds on Monday.

"You could see the ships turn over in the harbor, could see the boys fall in. There was a heavy sheet of oil steam over the water. A lot of people tried to get their launches and little boats out in the harbor to get these boys out, but the Japs kept machine gunning the harbor and made it pretty hard to rescue anybody. Those Japs would take out after a truck, a car, anything that was moving, and machine gun it.

Bomber Hit Arizona
"We saw the Arizona get a hit. It was docked right in front of the hill where we stood. A dive bomber came in, the anti-aircraft got it and it dove right into the ship. Some say a bomb went down the funnel. Well, right after the bomber hit the

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LABOR PARLEYS FOR DISTRICT COMPLETE

The negotiations meeting between the Pine Industrial Relations committee, and the Klamath Basin District council of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO, have been concluded, with all points in negotiations having been settled satisfactorily with the exception of the union shop provision, which the union had asked to be included in the contract, a statement from the negotiators said Thursday.

No agreement was reached between the two parties on the union shop provision, but it was agreed to submit the question to the war labor board with a joint recommendation by the PIRC, the panel from the United States conciliation service, who had participated in the meetings, and the KBD council that they reach and submit a decision on that point as soon as possible.

At previous meetings the two committees had agreed that they would recommend to their principals that they accept the findings of the war labor board arbitrator in the fir industry case now awaiting decision on the questions of wages, hours of labor, and vacations. The decision of the arbitrator is expected to be announced within a few days.

Issues not included in the arbitrator's decision with which the committees agreed to abide were: uniform termination of contracts throughout the area; seniority, and a method for handling grievances.

Negotiators for both parties expressed the opinion that the establishment of area-wide grievance appeal machinery should prove to be a valuable step toward stabilization of labor relations in the Klamath basin.
