said to have shot 25 soviet tanks to pieces Wednesday during "desperate but useless attempts to break through the German ring."

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts) May 29 (AP) — The high command reported today that soviet forces had attacked on the central sector of the Russian front—presumably before Moscow—and had been repulsed in a fierce fight with some of the attacking force encircled.

In the long-contested Kharkov sector a communique said the Germans were mopping up with the "number of prisoners and amount of booty mounting steadily."

Military circles said that the big Kharkov battle had ended and that fighting was continuing only in the area south of the city against remnants of soviet forces.

On the far northern front, the communique said a local attack resulted in some gains. Scattered enemy attacks were called unsuccessful.

son, war production chief, a pledge to "do all possible to offset any effect it might have on the production program and labor unity."

"I ask the American workers not to become confused, or shocked," he said in a statement, "by the attorney general's deportation order, nor permit a weakening in any respect in our national unity. Now is the time, as never before, for greater production of arms and equipment for our men in the fighting forces."

Biddle's opinion, generally regarded as a surprise, was welcomed on Capitol Hill.

Chairman Van Nuys (D-Cal.) of the senate judiciary committee called it "a very wholesome order," and Senator George (D-Ga.) said "the country will be gratified."

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29 (AP) — Harry Bridges last night angrily denounced as "outrages" a government order for his deportation and warned "we have just begun to fight" the deportation proceedings which have rested against him for nearly four years.

The wily leader of several thousand western CIO longshoremen broke a silence of several hours following announcement of the government's action, and strongly indicated an appeal to the courts of the deportation order.

"Even if the deportation order is eventually effected—and in that respect we have just begun to fight—I will be joining in Australia thousands of young American soldiers who are now receiving from the Japanese armed forces the scrap iron, explosives and other war materials we tried to keep from Japanese hands," Bridges said.

FRESNO, Calif., May 28 (UP) — The state executive board of the California state CIO council, in session here, tonight protested an order by Attorney General Francis Biddle for the immediate deportation of Harry Bridges, California CIO director.

identify the secret police chief by name, said the Germans had arrested the entire male population of the village where the attack occurred, evacuated all families and set fire to their homes in retaliation.

Czech circles here feared the executions in Prague were but the forerunner of wholesale killings which would make previous reprisals in France and other occupied countries insignificant by comparison.

The German announcement said the six, all members of one family, had been shot because they had "hidden people who participated in acts directed against German authorities."

Heydrich himself was reported in grave condition. An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Zurich, Switzerland, quoted reports from Prague as saying that Heydrich's spinal cord and spine were injured by three bullets which entered his body and that a German specialist had been summoned and performed an emergency operation.

be recognized throughout the world as a symbol of freedom on the one hand and of overwhelming power on the other."

Confusion Gone
The chief of staff said the confusion which existed in the minds of many Americans before Pearl Harbor was a thing of the past, and the American people, "solidly behind the army, are supporting wholeheartedly every measure for the prosecution of the war, and they are meeting with calm courage the vicissitudes inevitable in a war extending to the four corners of the earth."

"This attitude," Marshall said, "is exemplified in heroic measure by the parents and wives of those men who fought to the last ditch in the Philippines. Their fortitude was magnificent during those agonizing days of tragic uncertainty regarding their sons and husbands. The letters that have come to me from the mothers or wives of men lost in that heroic struggle are my greatest reassurance that America has steeled itself for a terrible struggle, with the implacable determination to hammer out a complete victory—decisive and final."

TEACHER SALARIES ADJUSTED BY BOARD

At a meeting of the budget board for Klamath union school district No. 2 held at the Klamath Union high school May 27, the board included a salary adjustment of \$200 for each teacher for the school year 1942-43. This was the amount recommended by a committee from the faculty as a result of a study made on the increase in living costs from September 1940 to March 1942. The \$200 adjustment is also intended to apply to all permanent employees of the high school as well as the teachers. The \$139 increase granted last year is included in the \$200 increment.

At the same meeting the board also adopted a new salary schedule for teachers which had been recommended by the faculty committee. The new schedule will adjust the salaries of a number of teachers who heretofore have been below the average in salary and yet have the educational and experience qualifications of higher salaried teachers. The new salary schedule makes provisions for education as well as experience in teaching fields. The increments to be granted each year will be contingent on satisfactory progress in the school system as well as attending summer school at one of the institutions of higher learning once every four years or to do equivalent work to be evaluated by the board of directors.

In applying the new schedule it is intended to use the \$200 salary adjustment to each teacher and consider the portion of this necessary to bring each teacher on schedule as permanent salary and the remaining portion as merely salary adjustment for the coming year.

British Look for German Drive on Caucasus Area

LONDON, May 29 (AP)—As a sequel to Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's thrust into the British defensive quadrilateral in Libya, military quarters here look for a German offensive in southern Russia toward the Caucasus from positions along the Sea of Azov.

The possibility of yet a third action—an air-borne attack on Syria and Iraq—was not discounted.

There probably would be more to the campaign than just the developing of the present thrust. Military men said that German parachute troops in Crete and German and Italian infantry and air formations in Greece and the Dodecanese were earmarked for use.

"Some parachutists may be used against Tobruk," one said.

Hefty Calf Born At Local Ranch

destroyed at least 35 Italian tanks in repulsing this assault. A German column which bypassed Bir Hacheim to the south consisted of some 250 tanks from the 15th and 21st panzer divisions.

Since the apparent frustration of their original plan, which seemed to be a sweep toward Tobruk, the German formations have tended to split up.

British headquarters evinced confidence, and the situation was regarded as satisfactory, with indications that developments have not gone as the Germans anticipated.

It was noted, however, that in a battle of this extremely elastic type the situation can change rapidly either way.

later will depend upon the relative losses suffered.

A NEW and stronger note is sounded from America today. General Marshall, U. S. chief of staff, addressing the graduating class at West Point, says: "American troops are landing in England; they WILL LAND in France."

That is further notice to Hitler that he must keep large forces in western Europe instead of using all his power, as he would like to do, against the Russians.

IN the early (and for him happy) days of the war, Hitler could safely concentrate overwhelming forces at a chosen point and batter his way through to victory, unhampered by fears that he might be attacked somewhere else at the precise moment when such an attack would be most disconcerting.

The most significant change in the war lies in the fact that this situation no longer exists. Hitler must now watch not only the front door, but the back door and the windows as well.

Wednesday. They suffered high casualties, the Chinese said. "Another 1000 enemy troops were killed and wounded in a day-long battle in the Lanchow sector May 28," the communique declared.

About 125 miles east of Kiangsu and slightly south, the high command said, several Japanese warships appeared off Tachow bay yesterday and shelled Longkian, but were repulsed by Chinese fire.

The communique did not mention the Yunnan-Burma front.

Cooler Winter in Store for Buildings Heated with Oil

SEATTLE, May 29 (AP) — Many residences, apartments and hotels in Oregon and Washington will be considerably cooler this winter as a result of an order issued by District Priorities Manager William D. Shannon drastically limiting the delivery of fuel oil supplies.

Shannon's order, issued yesterday, prevents refills of storage tanks of consumers who did not purchase fuel oil during the corresponding month of 1941, unless their tanks are empty, and those who bought fuel oil will be limited to one-half the amount received then.

Acknowledging that the reduction would probably create discomforts to some with the arrival of winter, Shannon said the order "will bring many of us to a realization of just how serious this fuel oil shortage is."

He said the restrictions will probably mean there will be no heat available in apartment houses and hotels in the daytime; hot water will have to be kept at a temperature of about 140 degrees and room temperatures around 65 degrees for such times as heat is to be furnished.

AT GIBRALTAR

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts) May 29 (AP)—A dispatch from Algiers today said the British battleship Malaya, the aircraft carrier Eagle, five large submarines, including one under the Polish flag, and destroyers arrived today at Gibraltar.

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
