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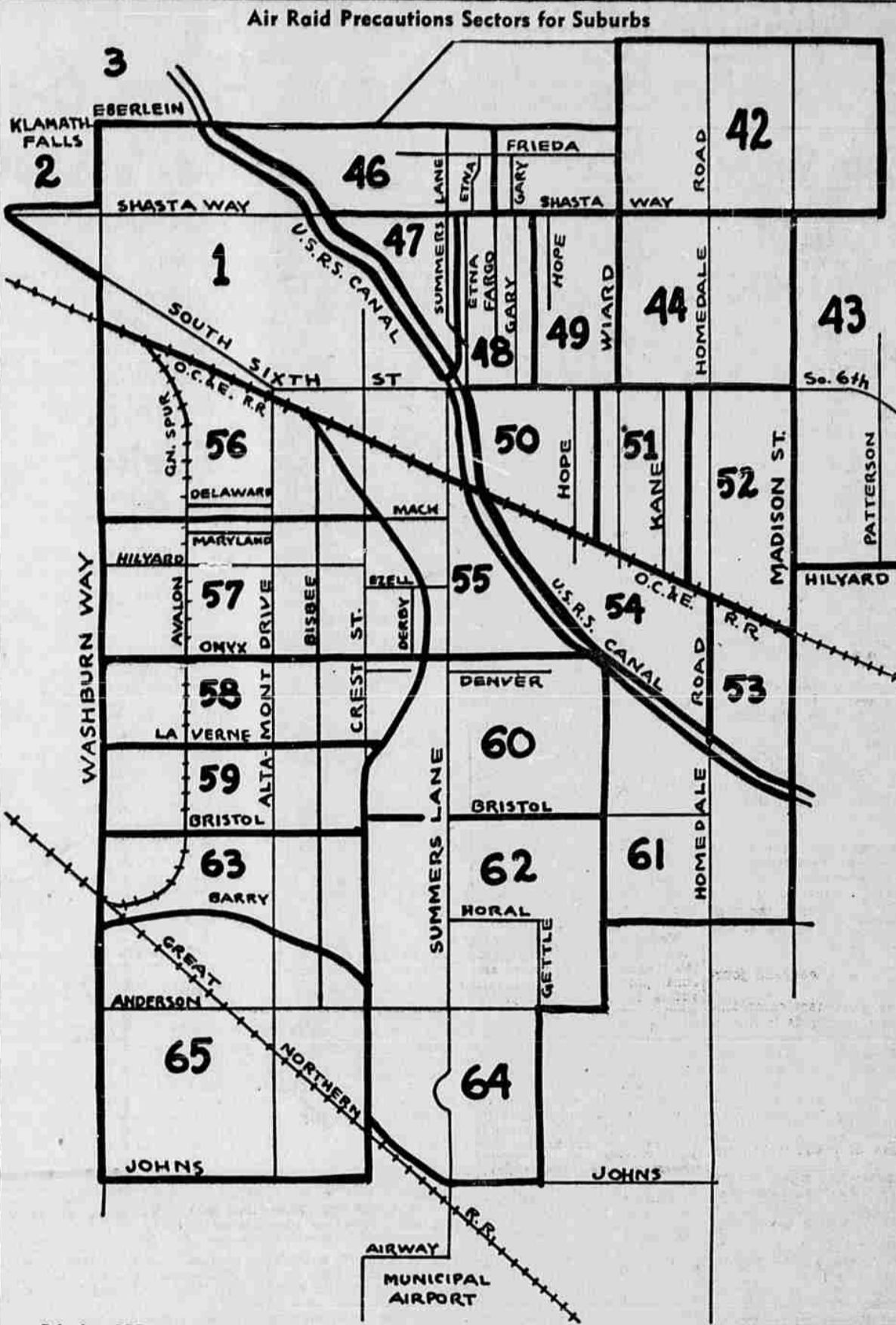

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AIR RAID WARDENS HOLD VITAL FRONT

In Klamath county is L. Orth Sisemore, and his assistant is Lawrence Slater, R. C. Dale holds the post of chief warden, with Robert W. Browning as his assistant. In charge of the chief warden's office is A. F. Croup. In an emergency, Sisemore and Slater would be stationed at the central control office, and air raid wardens would proceed to their sector posts.

Reproduced on this and the opposite page are two maps which may be used as a key for determining the name of the sector warden. One map shows the ARP sectors in the city and a few suburbs. The other shows the ARP sectors in the big southeast suburban area. If there is any confusion as to the sector, check with the man you think is your warden and he can tell you exactly.

In case of a blackout, contact your sector warden if you need help. Sector wardens will wear white arm-bands with two black triangles; assistant sector wardens' bands have one black triangle.

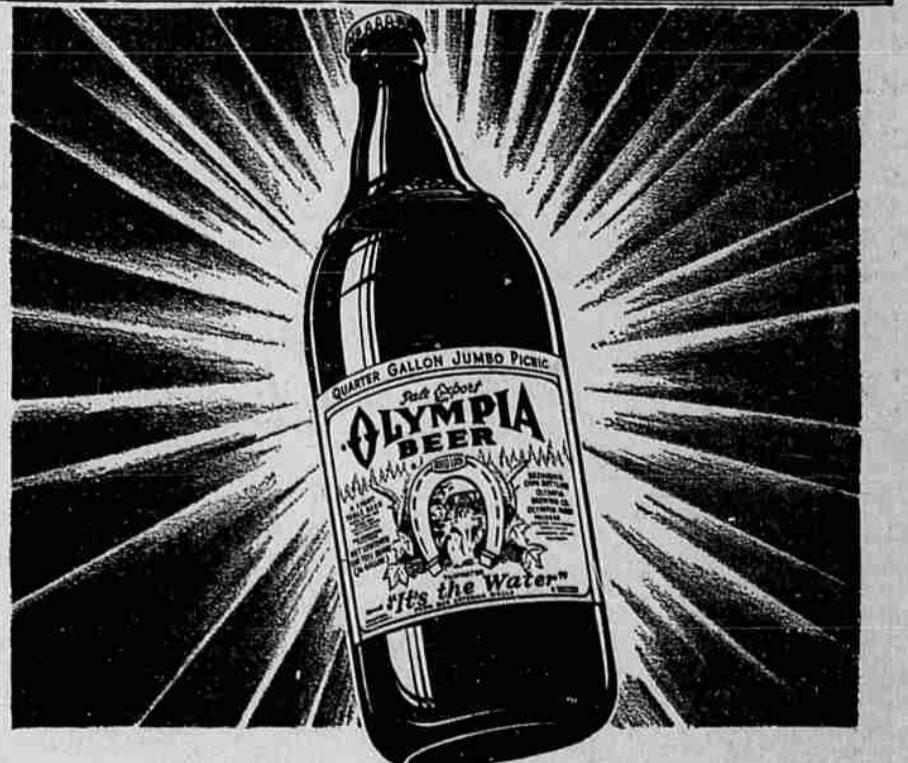
In addition to the sector wardens, there are 15 zone wardens throughout the county. They are William Lyons, Sam Miller, Joe Hicks, Ray Ruger, S. R. Brown, H. E. Barry, Garrett Van Riper, R. G. Motschenbacher, Roy T. Premo, Grover C. Motley, Walter Nichols, A. L. Paul, H. A. Burkhard, W. T. Long and Charlie Nelson.

In addition to the wardens, fire-watchers have been organized under John Ebinger. These watchers will take stations in town during a blackout for the purpose of combating incendiary bombs or calling aid if the blaze is out of control. Most of the watchers will be stationed at top of buildings.

The three remaining branches of the warden division are emergency feeding with T. M. Medford as chairman and T. H. Reeves as assistant. This service works hand-in-glove with the emergency housing service, under Fred Peterson. These men have a complete list of available facilities, such as schools, halls, lodges, where bombed or burned-out citizens could be temporarily housed and fed. Preparation and serving of the food is the job of the Red Cross canteen corps, organized here at the beginning of the year.

Final branch is transportation, with C. H. Foster as chairman. Assistants to Foster are Elmer Merritt, J. H. Robbins and P. J. Lesmeister. These men are responsible for the evacuation of the population, and control all means of official transportation during an emergency with the exception of the ambulances detailed to the medical services.

The phrase, "eat one's head off," was used as early as 1703.



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
