Haynes Holds 'em But Five Errors de Job

Minus the services of its star second baseman and Co-manager Ernie Bishop, the Pelican baseball club dropped its first home start of the 1942 season Sunday afternoon at Recreation park, losing a 6-1 decision to the Bend Loggers of the Oregon State league.

Errors figured heavily in the Klamath defeat as the visiting Loggers earned only one run off the nine-hit pitching of Virg Haynes, the Pelican No. 1 hurler. Five costly miscues contributed to the Bend scoring and allowed Manager Jack Gordon's crew to tally in five of the first six frames.

Jim Farmer, the veteran righthander for the invaders, limited the locals to six scattered safeties and but for an error by Catcher Houtchens he would have posted a shutout. Klamath's Paul Crapo, who paced the Pelicans with two hits in four tries, punched out a double as first man up in the second, advanced to third on a passed ball and crossed the plate when Houtchens let a strike get away from him.

Lakeview's Kidd Captures Broad Jump at Portland

PORTLAND, June 1 (AP)—Portland schools dominated the first Oregon-AAU track meet here Saturday.

The University of Portland won in the championship division with 30 points and Portland high schools won the first four places in prep competition.

Slim Jim Bocchi, Klamath Union high school high jumper, soared 5' 10" in winning his event. Kidd of Lakeview leaped 21' 10" to capture the broad jump.

And under those circumstances Snead went out to shoot some of the greatest home-stretch golf ever seen.

A triumph for Turnesa undoubtedly would have been more popular. The little guy with the nerves of steel and no business whatsoever in the finals of a P.G.A. championship, had captured the fancy of everybody. The crowd had been cheering his every shot for two days since he scored upset victories over Ben Hogan and Byron Whitey. Yet Snead richly deserved his victory.

Bosox Sell Jimmy Foxx To Chisox

BOSTON, June 1 (AP)—The Boston Red Sox today announced the outright cash sale of First Baseman Jimmy Foxx to the Chicago Cubs of the National league. No other players were involved, the club announced.

It was necessary for Owner Tom Yawkey to get waivers from other American league clubs in order to make the sale of Foxx, who long had been regarded as one of the game's modern stars.

Team captain of the Red Sox, Foxx played five full seasons in Red Sox regalia. He was purchased from Connie Mack's Athletics, with whom he broke into the big time as a catcher in 1926.

He has been incapacitated lately by sinus and by several cracked ribs he suffered when hit by a line drive while pitching batting practice. Ironically, the batter at the time was Harvard's Tony Lupien, who was brought up as his successor at first base.

Davis Stars But Trojans Win Crown

SEATTLE, June 1 (AP)—The gruelling stretch drive in the two mile. ... The cyclonic power of California's Hal Davis as he tied the century record. ... And the overwhelming strength in virtually all departments displayed by the Southern California Trojans.

Those were the outstanding bits in last Saturday's Pacific coast conference track and field meet, won for the seventh consecutive time by U.S.C.

The Trojans ran away with the meet, compiling 79 points. California was second with 43-4; followed by Stanford, 25-3; Washington, 21-1/3; Idaho, 14-3; Oregon State, 10-1/3; Washington State and Montana, 9 apiece; U.C.L.A., 7-3; and Oregon, 5-1/3.

Davis equalled the conference century record established here in 1939 by Clyde Jeffrey of Stanford when he legged the 100-yards in 9.6 despite a headwind. Davis also won the 220 yard dash to become the only double winner of the day.

Major league baseball enjoyed a rest today after the busiest weekend of the season, which brought disaster in double doses to many of the pennant contenders and success in the same quantities to those who could withstand the pressure of the games in two days.

A total of 392,280 fans swarmed to the ball parks, 197,820 of them on Decoration day and 194,460 of them yesterday. And that didn't include the hundreds of service men who were admitted free.

Here are some of the more important happenings witnessed:

The New York Yankees stretched their American league lead to eight games, although their eight-game winning streak was snapped by the Philadelphia Athletics in yesterday's second game.

The Brooklyn Dodgers boosted their lead in the National league to six games by stopping the Boston Braves twice yesterday after dividing a pair with the New York Giants the day before.

The Cleveland Indians skidded into fourth place in the American league while the Detroit Tigers took over second place and the Boston Red Sox moved up a notch to third.

The St. Louis Cardinals replaced the Boston Braves in second place in the National league by winning two out of three over the weekend while the Braves managed only an even split in four games.

Mel Ott, playing his 17th year in the majors—all with the Giants—led Rogers Hornsby's National league record of 1582 runs batted in by driving two runs across in yesterday's twin triumph over the Philadelphia Phils. It took Hornsby 23 seasons to establish the mark, which is considerably lower than Babe Ruth's major league record of 2209.

Max West of the Braves who had hit only two home runs this season and both of them last week, rapped four in two days.

Clyde Vollmer, recalled by Cincinnati from Syracuse to relieve an outfielder shortage caused by three injuries, arrived in time to play the second game against the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday and hit the first ball pitched to him for a home run.

As for the games themselves, two of yesterday's scheduled double-headers were cut in half by the weather but five of the six played resulted in double victories.
