Wage-Hour Law Ruled in Effect For Custodians

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—The supreme court has decided that the federal wage-hour law applies to employees engaged in the maintenance and operation of buildings whose tenants produce goods for interstate commerce. The justice department estimated these custodial and maintenance employees at 75,000. Justice Frankfurter delivered the 8 to 1 opinion, applying to employees of the Arsenal Building Corporation of New York City and the A. B. Kirschbaum company of Philadelphia. Justice Roberts dissented. The ruling had the effect of broadening the application of the minimum wage and maximum hour provisions of the legislation.

KLAMATH GETS \$214,500 WAR SAVINGS QUOTA

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Treasury spokesmen said today preliminary statistics indicated the \$600,000,000 May quota for war bond sales was surpassed easily.

For June, the quota has been raised to \$800,000,000, and, beginning with July, it will be lifted to \$1,000,000,000 a month. June quotas run from a minimum of \$100 in Armstrong county, South Dakota—which had a population of 42 in the last census—to \$121,794,100 in New York City, whose five counties have been lumped for quota purposes.

While the quotas of most of the nation's 3,070 counties have been upped by a rough one-third since May, several counties have obtained stiffer increases. The goal for Loving county, Texas, for instance, has been boosted from \$200 to \$3,400.

A quota of \$7,746,000 was set for Oregon during June. Average monthly sales for the state from July, 1941, through January, 1942, were \$4,032,776.

AFL WAGE REQUEST IN HANDS OF WLB

Currently-stated wage increase negotiations between the Klamath Basin district council of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union and the Pine Industrial Relations committee are in the hands of the department of labor, an LSW official said today.

John Stanioch, chief district representative of the LSW, said that council agents last met with a PIRC group on May 11. Negotiations were broken off, he said, when the unionists refused to discuss terms with employers whose men were represented by other than the LSW.

Stanioch said the council took the stand that mill executives whose men were either CIO members or not organized should have no part in determining wages, hours or working conditions of LSW workers.

Despite the breakdown in PIRC-LSW relations, it was understood that a number of local unions were conducting meetings with individual employers toward pay boosts.

No definite results from any were revealed.

Meanwhile both the PIRC and the CIO International Woodworkers of America awaited the important war labor board decision No. 90, governing a wage issue in the fir industry and which both the IWA and the PIRC have agreed to follow in the Klamath area.

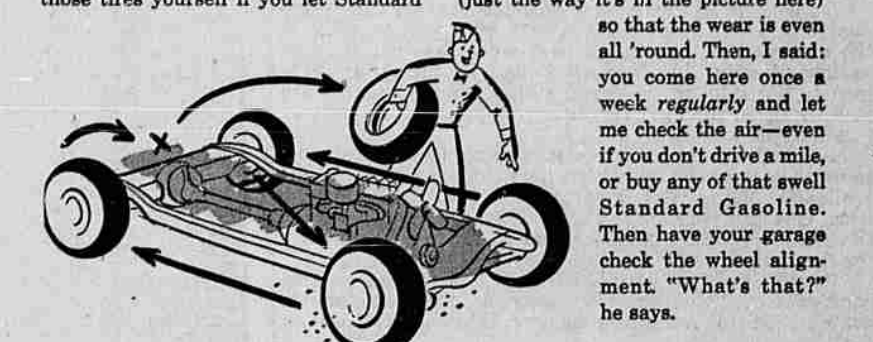
