ment have set aside \$180,000 to improve the vital defense and civilian needed road.

According to the plan, the Indian service was to start at the Chiloquin end and work toward Sprague River, while the state would do the work on the east end. It is the west section that the Indian service is now working on.

Heretofore the road has been practically level and in a few hours of rain the water has drained onto the road from nearby, creating the resemblance of a canal rather than a road. On many occasions the travelers cut out through the sagebrush and made a new road until in some places strangers are in a quandary to know just which is the road.

The Indian service, in charge of construction, is clearing a wide strip, and the dirt is being hauled to the center of the strip where a roadbed some six feet from the depth of the barrow pit is being constructed.

Although the citizens of Sprague River were keenly disappointed to see the work start on the least traveled section of the road, they are very pleased to see the long-awaited action to improve the road to Chiloquin. The section from Sprague River to the Lakeview highway is to be constructed by the state of Oregon. Things are at a standstill at present due to shortage of materials and labor for such a project. Both the state and the federal govern-



SOIL DISTRICT TO AID LAND LEVELING

The Langell valley soil conservation district is now assisting farmers in leveling land, drainage, laying out irrigation systems and making other conservation improvements, according to M. T. Prince, chairman of the board of supervisors of the district.

This assistance can be made available to those farmers within the district boundaries who made their application to the board of supervisors for a farm plan. The board consists of M. T. Prince, chairman; M. D. Settle, secretary treasurer; O. S. Campbell, Lloyd Gift and Cecil Conley.

The district can furnish the necessary engineering surveys and cost estimates free of charge to each farmer who wishes to cooperate with the district. These estimates then serve as a basis for the farmer to determine if he wishes to do the work with his own equipment or hire district equipment with operator on a per hour basis.

The district has a 50 Diesel tractor with dozer, land leveling scraper and chisel. The present rate of charge is \$2.75 per hour of actual use for the dozer, and \$2.50 per hour for the land leveling scraper and chisel. This charge includes operator, fuel and maintenance expense.

The tractor with dozer and engineering assistance has been made available to the Langell valley soil conservation district by the U.S.D.A. soil conservation service.

Prince stated that approximately 30 land owners have entered into farm plan agreements to use the equipment and engineering assistance to date. Since March 20, the district equipment in use has constructed three irrigation storage ponds, 800 rods of large diversion and irrigation ditches and leveled 150 acres of land. It is now estimated that approximately 1000 acres will be leveled, drained and a system of irrigation set up during the next five months.

This work will assist in producing crops and pasture needed in the "Food for Freedom" program, as well as increase values and make possible conservation use of these lands.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of Union High School District No. 2, of Klamath County, State of Oregon, that a special budget election will be held within the boundaries of said district, at Klamath Union High School, at Wall Street and The Alameda, in Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the 22nd day of June, 1942, from the hour of 2 o'clock p. m. to the hour of 7 o'clock p. m. to vote on the question (1) of increasing the amount of the tax levy in said Union High School District for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 1942, and ending on the 30th day of June, 1943, on the taxable property within said district, more than 6% over the tax levy for the preceding year, and (2) of adopting or rejecting the following budget of estimated expenditures for said district for said fiscal year.
